Page 1, between the enacting clause and line 1, begin a new paragraph and insert:

"SECTION 1. IC 22-3-3-21, AS AMENDED BY P.L.201-2005, SECTION 4, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2019]: Sec. 21. In cases of the death of an employee from an injury by an accident arising out of and in the course of the employee's employment under circumstances that the employee would have been entitled to compensation if death had not resulted, the employer shall pay the burial expenses of such employee, not exceeding ~~seven~~ **twelve** thousand five hundred dollars (~~\$7,500~~): **(\$12,500)**."

SECTION 2. IC 22-3-7-15, AS AMENDED BY P.L.201-2005, SECTION 8, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2019]: Sec. 15. In cases of the death of an employee from an occupational disease arising out of and in the course of the employee's employment under circumstances that the employee would have been entitled to compensation if death had not resulted, the employer shall pay the burial expenses of such employee, not exceeding ~~seven~~ **twelve** thousand five hundred dollars (~~\$7,500~~): **(\$12,500)**."

Mr. Speaker: Your Committee on Employment, Labor and Pensions, to which was referred House Bill 1222, has had the same under consideration and begs leave to report the same back to the House with the recommendation that said bill be amended as follows:

Page 1, between the enacting clause and line 1, begin a new paragraph and insert:

"SECTION 1. IC 5-10-10-6 IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2019]: Sec. 6. (a) Except as provided in subsection (b), a special death benefit of ~~seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000)~~ for a ~~public safety officer who dies in the line of duty before January 1, 1998; and one hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000)~~ for a public safety officer who dies in the line of duty ~~after December 31, 1997, before July 1, 2019, and two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000)~~ for a public safety officer who dies in the line of duty after June 30, 2019, shall be paid in a lump sum from the fund to the following relative of a public safety officer who dies in the line of duty:

- (1) To the surviving spouse.
- (2) If there is no surviving spouse, to the surviving children (to be shared equally).
- (3) If there is no surviving spouse and there are no surviving children, to the parent or parents in equal shares.

(b) If the fund would be reduced below two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) by payment in full of all claims that become final in any month, the board shall proceed as follows:

- (1) The board shall suspend payment of the claims that become final during that month and the following two (2) months.
- (2) At the end of the suspension period, the board shall pay all suspended claims. If the fund would be exhausted by payment in full of all suspended claims, the amount paid to each claimant shall be prorated."

Whereas, It is appropriate to recognize the Barr-Reeve girls volleyball team on their State Championship title: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly recognizes the Barr-Reeve girls volleyball team for winning the Indiana High School Athletic Association Class A State Championship on November 3, 2018.

RESOLUTIONS ON FIRST READING

Senate Concurrent Resolution 23

The Speaker handed down Senate Concurrent Resolution 23, sponsored by Representatives Errington and Wright:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION to memorialize Dr. Alice Swenson Bennett and her contributions to her community.

Whereas, Dr. Alice Swenson Bennett was born on August 16, 1929 in Chicago, IL, and married Carson Bennett in 1953;

Whereas, Graduating from Western Michigan College majoring in Chemistry and Biology, she went on to obtain her Masters in Biological Chemistry from the University of Michigan. She earned her Ph.D. from Purdue University in Biochemistry;

Whereas, Dr. Bennett taught for 31 years at Ball State University in the Biology Department in the fields of Molecular Biology, Biophysics, and Radiation Biology;

Whereas, Dr. Bennett's contributions include breast cancer research, mentoring students, serving as Chair of the University Senate, and faculty advocate. Over the course of her career she received many awards, including several in academia, First Amendment rights, voting rights, separation of church and state, women's rights, equality and social justice;

Whereas, Her most rewarding contributions were made while volunteering and supporting the Ross Community Center, American Civil Liberties Union, Planned Parenthood, American Association of University Women, League of Women Voters, National Organization for Women and Tax Aide for Seniors;

Whereas, As a member of the Unitarian Universalist Church since the 1950s, she taught Sunday school, served on the board and on the committee that planned the current church building. She also enjoyed playing tennis, bowling and traveling in the USA and Europe;

Whereas, Dr. Swenson Bennett was a tireless advocate with a big heart and sense of duty to her community;

Whereas, A trailblazer, never afraid to speak her mind and incredibly intelligent;

Whereas, Dr. Swenson Bennett passed away at the age of 89 on January 27, 2019; and
