**(2) the relocation will:**

**(A) result in a decrease in the distance between the relocating individual's residence and the nonrelocating individual's residence; or**

**(B) result in an increase of not more than twenty (20) miles in the distance between the relocating**

**individual's residence and the nonrelocating individual's residence;  
and allow the child to remain enrolled in the child's current school."**

## RESOLUTIONS ON FIRST READING

### House Resolution 25

Representative Frizzell introduced House Resolution 25:

A HOUSE RESOLUTION recognizing February 25 through March 3, 2019, as National Eating Disorders Awareness Week in 2019.

*Whereas, The 2019 theme of National Eating Disorders Awareness Week is "Come As You Are," with a focus on expanding the conversation around eating disorders to include the diverse perspectives of the millions of people affected;*

*Whereas, The goal of this year's campaign is to shine a light on these deadly illnesses, dispel misinformation, and connect people with the support they need to recover;*

*Whereas, Signs and symptoms of an eating disorder are often overlooked, and many individuals, families, and communities are unaware of the pressures, attitudes, and behaviors that lead to eating disorders;*

*Whereas, Eating disorders are serious conditions that can be life-threatening and have lasting impacts on a person's physical and emotional health;*

*Whereas, Many cases of eating disorders go undetected, and less than one-third of young people with eating disorders receive treatment;*

*Whereas, 20 million women and 10 million men in the United States suffer from clinically significant eating disorders at some time in their life, and these disorders affect people across all backgrounds and include anorexia nervosa, bulimia nervosa, and binge eating disorders;*

*Whereas, The National Eating Disorders Association strives to address the many misconceptions regarding eating disorders and highlights the availability of resources for treatment and support;*

*Whereas, National Eating Disorders Awareness Week is a collaborative effort consisting of mostly volunteers, including health care providers, eating disorder professionals, students, educators, and social workers;*

*Whereas, Prompt intensive treatment significantly improves the chance of recovery for individuals that suffer from an eating disorder; therefore, it is important for educators, medical providers, parents, and community members to be aware of the warning signs and the symptoms of eating disorders; and*

*Whereas, National Eating Disorders Awareness Week encourages people to share their stories and experiences with eating disorders and body image struggles; highlights the*

*importance of screening for early detection and intervention; dispels myths about disorders; and presents eating disorders as a public health issue that affects people regardless of age, gender, ethnicity, size, or background: Therefore,*

*Be it resolved by the House of Representatives  
of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 1. That the House of Representatives recognizes February 25 through March 3, 2019, as National Eating Disorders Awareness Week in 2019.

The resolution was read a first time and adopted by voice vote.

### House Resolution 31

Representative Austin introduced House Resolution 31:

A HOUSE RESOLUTION honoring Mr. John Edward Wilson.

*Whereas, Mr. John Edward Wilson was known for his exceptional drive, hard work, and mentorship displayed both on and off the basketball court;*

*Whereas, Mr. Wilson was born in 1927 and raised in Anderson, Indiana, where he attended Anderson High School. During high school he used his athletic ability to shatter racial barriers. Wilson led the Anderson Indians to their third state title in basketball, scoring 30 points in the 1946 championship game, then a state finals record;*

*Whereas, Mr. Wilson excelled in Anderson High School athletics and also enjoyed playing football, track, and baseball. His tremendous athletic ability led him to be named the state's first African-American Mr. Basketball and earned him the nickname "Jumpin' Johnny", which he later confirmed by winning the state championship in the high jump;*

*Whereas, Mr. Wilson aspired to play college basketball and worked diligently in spite of racial barriers still rampant in college athletics. He was not afforded the opportunity to play for his dream school, Indiana University, but continued his search for a strong athletic program and found the Ravens at Anderson College. While attending Anderson College he earned 11 letters in four different sports, was selected three times in basketball as all-conference and team MVP, was twice named all-American, and finished third in the nation in scoring in 1949;*

*Whereas, Anderson College's integrated basketball team was excluded from multiple opportunities, but Mr. Wilson built a notable college career and still holds Anderson University's records for career scoring average (23.3), season scoring average (25.4), and field goal attempts in a game (56) and ranks eighth on the career scoring list with 1,540 points. He was also named all-conference and team MVP in both baseball and track;*

*Whereas, Mr. Wilson joined the fabled Harlem Globetrotters and pioneered his famous drop kick shot, which became a regular part of the Globetrotters' routine, and he retired as a Globetrotter in 1954;*

*Whereas, Mr. Wilson returned to college, obtained a teaching degree, and accepted a coaching position at Indianapolis Wood High School. There, he became the first African-American coach at an integrated school in Indiana. In his eight seasons as coach, Wood teams won 139 games and lost 59;*

*Whereas, Mr. Wilson contributed many years to building strong basketball teams across high school and college campuses in Indiana and the U.S. He was dedicated to his players' success on the basketball court as well as their*

education. He was a mentor to many and taught the importance of personal resilience and working hard;

Whereas, Mr. Wilson was recognized many times for his excellence in athletics. Anderson High School erected a statue in his honor in 2016, and he was inducted into the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame in 1994 and the Anderson University Athletic Hall of Fame in 1997. He was named one of Madison County's 100 Greatest Athletes in 2012, one of the Top 50 Athletes of the Century in Indiana, and Co-Athlete of the Century by the Herald Bulletin with teammate and fellow Anderson University Hall of Famer Carl Erskine;

Whereas, Mr. Wilson was praised for his contributions to the community and received recognition from Malcolm X College, Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, the Boy Scouts of America, the Masons, Black Expo, and the city of Anderson and was chosen as a goodwill ambassador by the Harlem Globetrotters;

Whereas, Mr. Wilson also recognized many young men and women at the Herald Bulletin's "Johnny Wilson Awards" annual luncheon where local multisport student-athletes were recognized and honored; and

Whereas, Mr. Wilson made revolutionary contributions to the city of Anderson, the Madison County community, the state of Indiana, and our nation: Therefore,

*Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 1. That the House of Representatives honors the memory of Mr. John Edward Wilson for his contributions to athletics, Anderson, Indiana, the state of Indiana, and the United States of America.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit a copy of this resolution to the family of Mr. John Edward Wilson.

The resolution was read a first time and adopted by voice vote.

### House Resolution 32

A HOUSE RESOLUTION celebrating Indiana Senior Day at the Indiana Statehouse on March 5, 2019.

Whereas, Nearly 16 percent of Hoosiers are 65 years of age or older, according to data published by the United States Census Bureau in 2017;

Whereas, By 2030, one out of every five people living in Indiana will be a senior citizen (ages 65 and older), according to population projections released by the Indiana Business Research Center;

Whereas, Senior citizens continue to play vital roles in the growth and development of Indiana with many contributions to the economy, culture, and history of Indiana;

Whereas, Indiana Senior Day encourages civic engagement and promotes the involvement of senior citizens in the legislative process to discuss issues that are important to Hoosiers across Indiana; and

Whereas, Indiana Senior Day, in collaboration with community partners, offers an opportunity to learn more about important state, local, and federal resources available to Hoosiers 65 years of age and older: Therefore,

*Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 1. That the Indiana House of Representatives celebrates Indiana Senior Day at the Indiana Statehouse on March 5, 2019.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit copies of this resolution to Indiana State Representative Robin Shackelford for distribution.

Whereas, The Lady Sparkplugs and Speedway High School fans celebrated a remarkable season and state championship victory at Purdue University's Bittinger Stadium on June 9, 2018;

Whereas, The Lady Sparkplugs defeated top-ranked Bremen High School, 5-0, to win the IHSAA Class 2A title;

Whereas, The Lady Sparkplugs achieved a remarkable fourth-straight shutout that started with their win over Cardinal Ritter High School in sectional play;

Whereas, Speedway High School freshman pitcher Kaiah Fenters entered the championship game with 209 strikeouts and a 1.85 earned run average and earned the win in the championship game by pitching a one-hit, seven-inning shutout;

Whereas, The Lady Sparkplugs of Speedway High School made history through their hard work, dedication, skill, focus, and teamwork, and one of their own, Rylee Wade, was recognized with the IHSAA Class 2A Mental Attitude Award;

Whereas, The Lady Sparkplugs finished their 2018 season with a record of 22 wins, 6 losses, and 1 tie;

Whereas, Head Coach Alyssa Coleman finished her Speedway High School coaching career by leading the Lady Sparkplugs to a championship win and was supported by assistant coaches Carl Fenters and Kati Gregory;

Whereas, The 2018 Speedway High School girls softball state champions were: Rylee Wade, Nikki Ray, Paige Rush, Rachael Gregory, Emma DeVault, Madison Golden, Katie Endres, Josie Frey, Alexa Faulkner, Lexi Laffin, Kendall Short, Kylee Man, Hannah Lindsey, Jackie Eversole, Kaiah Fenters, Madison Barnes, Brooke Hartman, Kayte Tunquist, Lane Hooper, and Molly Griner; and

Whereas, This achievement will be remembered by players, coaches, staff, friends, family, and fans for years to come: Therefore,

*Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 1. That the Indiana House of Representatives congratulates the Speedway High School girls softball team for its 2018 state championship win.

*Whereas, Staunton Elementary is one of seven elementary schools that make up the Clay Community Schools district, and supports a student population in which 53 percent of all students qualify for free and reduced lunches;*

*Whereas, Staunton Elementary has been named a Four Star School multiple times by the Indiana Department of Education for its commitment to excellence and student success;*

*Whereas, Staunton Elementary has consistently received an "A" rating according to the Indiana Department of Education for exceeding state based performance targets that focus on the areas of English/Language Arts and Math;*

*Whereas, The U.S. Department of Education has operated the National Blue Ribbon Schools Program since 1982, and recognizes public and private elementary, middle, and high schools based on their overall academic excellence or their progress in closing achievement gaps among student subgroups; and*

*Whereas, Staunton Elementary received the 2018 National Blue Ribbon School Award and was one of the 349 schools chosen for the distinction, placing the school among the top 0.3 percent of all schools in the nation: Therefore,*

*Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:*

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly congratulates Staunton Elementary School as a recipient of the 2018 National Blue Ribbon School Award.

*Whereas, After her state championship performance, Wilson was named the 2018 IHSAA mental attitude award winner for girls cross country;*

*Whereas, In four trips to the IHSAA individual girls cross country state finals, Wilson never finished outside the top-10;*

*Whereas, In addition to her two cross country state championships, Wilson won two state championships in the 3200 meter run in 2017 and 2018, and a state championship in the 1600 meter run in 2017;*

*Whereas, After graduation, Wilson plans to continue her running career at the University of Illinois; and*

*Whereas, Wilson's outstanding athletic achievements deserve recognition: Therefore,*

*Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the House of Representatives concurring:*

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly congratulates Emma Wilson on winning the 2018 IHSAA girls cross country state championship.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to transmit copies of this resolution to Emma Wilson and her family.
