RESOLUTIONS ON FIRST READING

House Concurrent Resolution 28

House Concurrent Resolution 28, sponsored by Senator Tomes:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION urging the Indiana Senate and the Indiana House of Representatives to adopt the practice of recommitting all bills creating or amending a criminal penalty to the Senate Corrections and Criminal Law Committee or the House Courts and Criminal Code Committee after the bill has passed the committee to which the bill was originally assigned. (The introduced version of this resolution was prepared by the interim study committee on corrections and criminal code.)

Whereas, In 2014, the General Assembly adopted House Bill 1006, which was the culmination of a five year study to make Indiana's Criminal Code consistent, proportional, and effective;

Whereas, The House and Senate criminal committees have the responsibility to review bills that create new crimes or change criminal penalties, and to make sure that Indiana's Criminal Code overall remains consistent, proportional, and effective;

Whereas, In the previous three legislative sessions, over 35 bills adding or amending a criminal penalty have been assigned to a noncriminal committee;

Whereas, The House and Senate criminal committees cannot carry out their responsibilities to ensure that Indiana's criminal penalties overall remain consistent, proportional, and effective unless the committees review all bills adding or amending a criminal penalty;

Whereas, The practice in the General Assembly has been to require bills having a certain fiscal impact to be reviewed by the Senate Appropriations Committee and the House Ways and Means Committee to ensure that financial resources are appropriately, effectively, and consistently deployed across the state; and

Whereas, The chairs of the House Courts and Criminal Code Committee and the Senate Corrections and Criminal Law Committee jointly believe that a similar practice of reviewing criminal penalties would ensure that Indiana's Criminal Code overall remains consistent, proportional, and effective: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly urges that the Indiana Senate and the Indiana House of Representatives adopt the practice of recommitting all bills creating or amending a criminal penalty to the Senate Corrections and Criminal Law Committee or the House Courts and Criminal Code Committee after the bill has passed the committee to which the bill was originally assigned.

SECTION 2. That the House Courts and Criminal Code Committee and the Senate Corrections and Criminal Law Committee conduct a review of the criminal penalties of bills recommitted to their committee, but not of other substantive provisions of the bills, and determine whether the criminal penalties are consistent and proportional when compared to other criminal penalties in the Indiana Code.

The resolution was read in full and referred to the Committee on Corrections and Criminal Law.

RESOLUTIONS ON FIRST READING

House Concurrent Resolution 26

House Concurrent Resolution 26, sponsored by Senator Crider:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION congratulating the New Palestine High School softball team.

Whereas, The 2019 New Palestine High School softball team won the Indiana High School Athletic Association's Class 3A state title on June 8, 2019;

Whereas, The Dragons closed out the competition with a 10-0 win, becoming the first school in IHSAA history to win three consecutive state championships in softball;

Whereas, New Palestine pitcher Sam Booe allowed just two hits and one walk, and struck out six during the state championship, finishing the season 18-0;

Whereas, New Palestine's Emma Tucher and Emily O'Conner led the Dragons in offense, with leadoff hitter Jaylin Calvert scoring three runs;

Whereas, Coach Ed Marcum led the Dragons to their third consecutive state title win, and sixth overall, since joining the program in 2003;

Whereas, The Dragons' state championship win, and 90-6 record in the last three years, reflects the hard work, talent, skill, and commitment given by each player to high school softball and their team; and

Whereas, This achievement will be remembered by players, coaches, staff, friends, family, and fans for years to come: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly congratulates the New Palestine High School softball team for its 2019 state championship win.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit copies of this resolution to coach Ed Marcum of the New Palestine High School softball team for distribution.

House Concurrent Resolution 27

House Concurrent Resolution 27, sponsored by Senator Crider:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION recognizing Charlie Spegal.

Whereas, Charlie Spegal was selected as Mr. Football by The Indianapolis Star and Indiana Football Coaches Association in 2019;

Whereas, Spegal has rushed for more yards and run for more touchdowns than any other player in the history of Indiana high school football;

Whereas, Spegal rushed for 10,867 yards, ran for 173 touchdowns, and scored 1,054 points during his high school career;

Whereas, Spegal is the first Mr. Football to come from New Palestine High School;

Whereas, Spegal has accepted a preferred walk-on offer from Indiana University; and

Whereas, Spegal has earned the respect of his teammates and coaches throughout Indiana with his outstanding athletic performance and strength of character: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly congratulates Charlie Spegal on the occasion of his selection as Mr. Football for 2019 and wishes him success at Indiana University.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit copies of this resolution to the office of State Representative Robert Cherry for distribution.

The resolution was read in full and adopted by voice vote. The Chair instructed the Secretary to inform the House of the passage of the resolution.

Senate Resolution 27

Senate Resolution 27, introduced by Senator Niezgodski:

A SENATE RESOLUTION to honor Indiana's Hispanic/Latino entrepreneurs for their work creating small businesses and their contributions to Hoosier workforce development.

Whereas, Hispanic/Latino-owned businesses are the fastest growing small business sector throughout the United States, growing at more than fifteen times the national rate. Across the nation, there are around 3.3 million Hispanic/Latino-owned firms that generate over \$473 billion in sales;

Whereas, In central Indiana alone, there are nearly 5,000 Hispanic/Latino-owned businesses. These businesses employ thousands of Hoosiers and contribute millions of dollars in revenue to the state's economy each year;

Whereas, Importantly, Indiana's Hispanic/Latino population has increased from 214,536 in 2000 to 477,988 in 2019. As of July 2019, Hispanic/Latino individuals represent 7% of Indiana's population;

Whereas, The over 400,000 members of the Hispanic/Latino community living in Indiana, and their businesses, have helped shape the economy, the culture, and the identity of the state of Indiana; and

Whereas, The Hoosier Hispanic/Latino community strengthens Indiana and drives its development: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana Senate honors Hispanic/Latino entrepreneurs in Indiana for their work creating small businesses and their contribution to Hoosier workforce development.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to transmit a copy of this resolution to the Indiana State Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, the Latin American Chamber of Commerce of South Bend, the Latino Chamber Alliance of Evansville, the Indy Chamber's Hispanic Business Council, the Greater Fort Wayne Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, El Centro Communal Latino, Latinas Welding Guild, Luis Palacio, Sophia McDowell, Gilberto Perez, Jr., Maria Wildridge, the Morales Group, and the Mexican Consulate in Indianapolis.

House Concurrent Resolution 29

House Concurrent Resolution 29, sponsored by Senators Melton, Mrvan, Niemeyer, and Lonnie M. Randolph:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION remembering Dr. Walter "Jerry" Watkins.

Whereas, Dr. Walter J. Watkins passed away on Monday, December 30, 2019, after serving the School City of Hammond district for 42 years;

Whereas, Dr. Watkins began his career in Hammond schools as an educator at Eggers Middle School teaching English and reading before serving as assistant principal and then principal;

Whereas, Dr. Watkins brought his experience and leadership to a secondary director role for the district before rising to the position of superintendent where he served for more than 16 years;

Whereas, The School City of Hammond district is Northwest Indiana's largest school district with an estimated enrollment of 13,100 students;

Whereas, Dr. Watkins retired in June 2019 after helping secure much needed funding in a 2017 referendum to build a new school near the aging Hammond High School; and

Whereas, Dr. Watkins was the first African-American superintendent in his school district, and served as a champion of diversity and inclusion in his community: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly remembers Dr. Walter "Jerry" Watkins as a role model for students and fellow leaders in his community and the state of Indiana;

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit copies of this resolution to the office of State Representative Carolyn Jackson for distribution.

The resolution was read in full and adopted by standing vote. The Chair instructed the Secretary to inform the House of the passage of the resolution.

Senate Concurrent Resolution 26

Senate Concurrent Resolution 26, introduced by Senator Boots:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION memorializing Sandy Woolwine and honoring the heroic actions of North Central Parke Community School Corporation students.

Whereas, Sandy Woolwine, a beloved bus driver for the North Central Parke Community School Corporation, had a medical emergency while driving her daily afternoon route on January 6, 2020;

Whereas, The five students aboard the bus, Gavin and Legend Smith, Dylan Lamb, Logan Bowles, and Brayton Myers, acted bravely and beyond their years during the emergency;

Whereas, Always looking out for the safety of her students, Sandy pulled over and turned the bus off at the next stop, where Gavin and Legend Smith's father was luckily waiting;

Whereas, Sandy was helped off the bus, and the students waited with her, holding Sandy's hand and comforting her until emergency personnel arrived;

Whereas, When EMS arrived, Dylan Lamb told the technicians that Sandy did not drive the bus that morning because she had the flu, information that was critical for EMS and hospital staff to care for Sandy as she was unconscious; and

Whereas, Although efforts to revive Sandy were unsuccessful, the quick and heroic actions of Sandy and the five students aboard the bus saved student lives and prevented further danger to the students and community: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the House of Representatives concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly memorializes Sandy Woolwine and honors the North Central Parke Community School Corporation students for their heroic actions on January 6, 2020.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to transmit copies of this Resolution to the family of Sandy Woolwine, Gavin and Legend Smith, Dylan Lamb, Logan Bowles, and Brayton Myers.

The resolution was read in full and adopted by standing vote. The Chair instructed the Secretary to inform the House of the passage of the resolution. House sponsors: Representatives Baird and Morrison.

Senate Concurrent Resolution 27

Senate Concurrent Resolution 27, introduced by Senators Rogers, Becker, Breaux, L. Brown, Donato, Glick, Houchin, Leising and Spartz:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION recognizing Perinatal Palliative Care personnel in Indiana.

Whereas, Perinatal Palliative Care is a multi-disciplinary model of support for parents and their fetus who is prenatally diagnosed with a chronic, life-limiting, or life-threatening condition;

Whereas, The number of infants born between 22-25 weeks gestation and families in need of Perinatal Palliative Care continues to grow with advances in prenatal testing and diagnostic medicine;

Whereas, Perinatal hospice care includes care planning with families after a life-limiting diagnosis has been made, attending Obstetrical and Maternal Fetal Medicine appointments with families, helping families locate home health care options if their baby is able to live the remainder of their life at home, and providing help with funeral care options and follow-up care after the death of their baby;

Whereas, Bereavement coordinators create mementoes, photographs, and keepsakes for families after the death of their precious baby;

Whereas, Hospitals provide remembrance events, including Christmas Memorials, Mother's Day and Father's Day events, and miscarriage burials;

Whereas, Hospitals offer peer support groups that may meet multiple times in a month to provide support for families in need;

Whereas, Coalition hospitals provide follow-up through phone calls, newsletters, and note cards after a loss to nurture a healing environment for families and ease the transition into subsequent parenting if parents wish to have future children;

Whereas, Additional pregnancy support groups are offered to families during subsequent pregnancies where it can be a very emotional time after the loss of a child; and

Whereas, Perinatal Palliative Care staff help families cope with the loss of a child and provide a network of support for families in need: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the House of Representatives concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly recognizes Perinatal Palliative Care personnel in Indiana.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to transmit copies of this Resolution to Joni Cutshaw, Marcia Jenkins, and Allison White of Franciscan Health, Jane Heustis and Kim Taylor of IU Health, Angie Bess Martin of Eskenazi Health, Jenny Cable and Amber Lafayette of Ascension St. Vincent Health, Jennifer Waitt of Community Health Network, Stacey Fischel of Now I Lay Me Down to Sleep Photography, and Marian Borondy.

The resolution was read in full and adopted by voice vote. The Chair instructed the Secretary to inform the House of the passage of the resolution. House sponsor: Representative Stutzman.

Senate Resolution 19

Senate Resolution 19, introduced by Senator Houchin:

A SENATE RESOLUTION memorializing Tammy Kemp and urging continued recognition of Tammy's Law.

Whereas, Senate Enrolled Act 392 (2019) was deemed "Tammy's Law" to memorialize Tammy Kemp, who passed away on May 5, 2019, after a long battle with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS);

Whereas, Tammy Kemp and her husband, Jeff, advocated the Act's passage after Tammy was unable to obtain Medicare gap insurance coverage following her ALS diagnosis, causing emotional and financial distress for Tammy's family;

Whereas, The Act's provisions require insurers that make Medicare supplement policies available to Medicare-eligible individuals based on age to make at least one Medicare Plan A supplement policy available to Medicare-eligible individuals based on disability;

Whereas, The Act received bipartisan approval from the Indiana General Assembly before it was signed into law by Governor Holcomb on May 5, 2019;

Whereas, Tammy's Law is a critical tool for individuals with disabilities who did not have access to Medicare gap insurance prior to the law's enactment, and provides protection from financial troubles due to gap coverage ineligibility; and

Whereas, Though Tammy Kemp will not benefit from the Act that bears her name, countless Hoosiers and their families will be able to purchase Medicare gap insurance coverage because of Tammy's Law: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana Senate memorializes Tammy

Kemp and urges continued recognition of Tammy's Law to provide critical Medicare gap insurance to disabled Hoosiers.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to transmit a copy of this Resolution to Jeff Kemp, husband of Tammy Kemp and advocate for Tammy's Law.

The resolution was read in full and adopted by standing vote.

Senate Resolution 22

Senate Resolution 22, introduced by Senator Bassler:

A SENATE RESOLUTION honoring the Monday Afternoon Club for 125 years of cultural and literary endeavors.

Whereas, Established in January 1895 as a local literary club to further the education of its members in cultural and literary endeavors, the Monday Afternoon Club has continued meeting for 125 years;

Whereas, In 1901, the Monday Afternoon Club solicited funds from industrialist and philanthropist Andrew Carnegie to form the Washington Carnegie Public Library, and the Monday Afternoon Club continues to assist the Library with financial donations and book purchases;

Whereas, In 1909, the Monday Afternoon Club assisted in the establishment of the Daviess Community Hospital to serve the health and medical needs of the public;

Whereas, In 1918, a surgical dressing unit and the Red Cross Society were organized with the Monday Afternoon Club's assistance;

Whereas, Each organization founded or assisted by the Monday Afternoon Club continue to thrive and meet their humanitarian goals; and

Whereas, Enlightenment in literature and other fields of knowledge continue to be the focus and aim of the Monday Afternoon Club: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana Senate honors the Monday Afternoon Club for 125 years of cultural and literary endeavors.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to transmit copies of this Resolution to the members of the Monday Afternoon Club.

The resolution was read in full and adopted by voice vote.

House Concurrent Resolution 30

House Concurrent Resolution 30, sponsored by Senator Sandlin:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION recognizing the Indiana Rangers, Company D of the 151st Infantry Regiment of the Indiana National Guard.

Whereas, The soldiers of the 151st Infantry Regiment of the Indiana National Guard exited the Vietnam War and returned home 50 years ago on November 26, 1969;

Whereas, The 151st Infantry Regiment received more decorations during their year of service in Vietnam than any other Army infantry company during any one year period of the Vietnam War;

Whereas, The lineage of the 151st Infantry Regiment dates back to the formation of the 2nd Regiment of Indiana Volunteers in June 1846;

Whereas, Company D of the 151st Infantry Regiment was commonly referred to as the Indiana Rangers;

Whereas, The Indiana Rangers were activated in March of 1968 in preparation for a deployment to Vietnam;

Whereas, Camp Atterbury (EAST) served as the new home for the Indiana Rangers upon their arrival in Vietnam in December of 1968;

Whereas, The Indiana Rangers were the only Army National Guard ground maneuver unit to serve in Southeast Asia;

Whereas, The Indiana Rangers served in Vietnam from December of 1968 to November of 1969;

Whereas, Governor Edgar G. Whitcomb declared November 26, 1969, as "Unity Day", ordering all state and county offices closed in recognition of Company D's return home;

Whereas, The Indiana General Assembly remembers this day and recognizes that the Indiana Rangers served in the Vietnam War and fought for the United States with bravery and honor; and

Whereas, It is fitting that the Indiana Rangers and all members of the armed forces who served in the Vietnam War continue to be held in the highest possible regard by their community, the state of Indiana, and the United States: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly recognizes the Indiana Rangers, Company D of the 151st Infantry Regiment of the Indiana National Guard, for their bravery during the Vietnam War.

SECTION 2. That the Indiana General Assembly honors the Indiana Rangers for their service and sacrifice during the Vietnam War on behalf of their community, the state of Indiana, and United States of America.

SECTION 3. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives transmit copies of this resolution to the office of State Representative Dennis Zent for distribution.

The resolution was read in full and adopted by voice vote. The Chair instructed the Secretary to inform the House of the passage of the resolution.

House Concurrent Resolution 22

House Concurrent Resolution 22, sponsored by Senator Raatz:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION recognizing Mr. Philip Stevenson and his retirement as superintendent of Centerville-Abington Community Schools.

Whereas, Mr. Philip Stevenson began his career with Centerville schools in 1972 teaching social studies at Centerville High School;

Whereas, Mr. Stevenson served the students, families, and faculty of Centerville High School as a teacher, assistant principal, and principal for 32 years before rising to the task of superintendent in 2005;

Whereas, Mr. Stevenson endeavored to bring quality education and support to the Centerville-Abington Community Schools as superintendent and in doing so received awards

including the Community in Schools Champion of Education Award in 2010; and

Whereas, Mr. Stevenson's leadership earned him recognition as the East Central District VI Superintendent of the Year in 2014 and the Wayne County Chamber of Commerce Educator of the Year in 2016: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly recognizes Mr. Philip Stevenson for his leadership as superintendent of Centerville-Abington Community Schools and 47 years of service to Centerville schools.

SECTION 2. That the Indiana General Assembly congratulates Mr. Philip Stevenson on his retirement in June 2020.

SECTION 3. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit copies of this resolution to the office of State Representative Brad Barrett for distribution.
