RESOLUTIONS ON FIRST READING

Senate Concurrent Resolution 40

The Speaker handed down Senate Concurrent Resolution 40, sponsored by Representative Frye:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION recognizing and congratulating the City of Rising Sun on the occasion of its bicentennial anniversary.

Whereas, The land surrounding present-day Ohio County, Indiana was originally a hunting ground for many Native American tribes. The land's elevation above the Ohio River made it particularly disease-free, and wildlife flourished. These qualities appealed to both Native Americans and European settlers alike;

Whereas, Documentation of settlers prior to the Northwest Ordinance becoming official is difficult, due to the lack of troops to provide protection. The first documented settlers were members of the family of Samuel Fulton, an uncle to steamboat inventor Robert Fulton;

Whereas, In 1814, John James of Fredericksburg, Maryland, journeyed to the area and purchased a large tract of land from Colonel Benjamin Chambers, who had acquired the land while conducting the original survey for the Northwest Ordinance. John James and his son, Pinckney, surveyed the land and platted what was to be Rising Sun. In 1816, John James registered the town of Rising Sun;

Whereas, Various legends claim credit for the naming of the town of Rising Sun, but most attribute the name to the beautiful daybreak that one may witness from the hills overlooking the Ohio River;

Whereas, The small town grew rapidly, growing to a population of 700 by 1816. A large German community formed, and other settlers came too, looking for new homes and opportunities;

Whereas, Trade and commerce in the town flourished during the 1830s and 1840s. Rising Sun began producing steamboats, plows, and many other goods, which were shipped on the Ohio

River to many port cities. Rising Sun quickly grew a reputation as one of the great cities in the north because of the large amount of goods coming out of the city. During this time, the population of Rising Sun grew to approximately 2,500;

Whereas, In 1844, partially due to a "clerical error," the new Ohio County, with Rising Sun as the county seat, successfully separated from Dearborn County. In 1845, the present Ohio County courthouse was built entirely by donation. The courthouse remains the oldest courthouse in continuous operation in the State of Indiana;

Whereas, Around the same time, the "iron horse" was invented, which allowed for the shipping of goods inland. The locomotive was not dependent upon seasonal changes and depths of rivers. As the locomotive became the predominant method of moving goods, Rising Sun, still dependent on river traffic for the shipment of goods, began to lose many of the businesses that had lead to its growth; and

Whereas, Without a rail line, Rising Sun settled into a sleepy existence. However, several small family-owned businesses still flourish in the town, which retains its quaint beauty and welcoming Hoosier hospitality: Therefore,

*Be it resolved by the Senate
of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana,
the House of Representatives concurring:*

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly recognizes and congratulates the City of Rising Sun on the occasion of its bicentennial anniversary.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to send copies of this resolution to Branden Roeder, Mayor of the City of Rising Sun.

The resolution was read a first time and adopted by voice vote. The Clerk was directed to inform the Senate of the passage of the resolution.

Senate Concurrent Resolution 42

The Speaker handed down Senate Concurrent Resolution 42, sponsored by Representative Ubelhor:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION honoring Purple Heart recipients First Sergeant Gregory Swanson and World War II veteran Leonard Wayne McIntosh for their service, sacrifice, and courage.

Whereas, The Purple Heart is awarded to members of the armed forces of the United States who are wounded by an instrument of war in the hands of the enemy and posthumously to the next of kin in the name of those who are killed in action or die of wounds received in action. The honor is specifically a combat decoration;

Whereas, Leonard Wayne McIntosh, a resident of rural Bloomfield, Indiana, joined the United States Army at age 17, and served for three years in the United States Army's 3rd Infantry Division during the height of the European Theatre of World War II from 1942 to 1945;

Whereas, The 3rd Division was one of the few American divisions that fought the Axis on all European fronts and was among the first United States combat units to engage in offensive ground combat operations during World War II. During World War II, the 3rd Division fought in North Africa, Sicily, Italy, France, Germany, and Austria for 531 consecutive days of combat;

Whereas, McIntosh was injured in a town in southern France when a building into which he was sent was bombed. Wayne lost consciousness from the bombing and regained consciousness in a hospital in London, England;

Whereas, Although McIntosh carried the scars of war and

metal fragments from the German bombing for most of his adult life, McIntosh was never awarded a Purple Heart by the United States government due to the destruction of his war service records in a 1973 fire in Saint Louis, Missouri. During the fire at the National Personnel Records Center, approximately 16 to 18 million Official Military Personnel Files were destroyed, including approximately 80 percent of Army personnel discharge papers from November 1, 1912 to January 1, 1960;

Whereas, First Sergeant Gregory Swanson, a resident of rural Bloomfield, Indiana, joined the Indiana Army National Guard at age 17, and serves in the 387th Military Police Company out of New Albany, Indiana;

Whereas, First Sergeant Swanson is an experienced war veteran who has served tours of duty in Iraq, Afghanistan, and in Newport, Indiana at the Newport Chemical Depot as part of a Homeland Security tour;

Whereas, First Sergeant Swanson was injured in Afghanistan in 2012 when the armored truck he was riding in was attacked by insurgents with rocket-propelled grenades and small arms. All inside the truck were injured, and Swanson sustained a leg injury. Swanson still carries some shrapnel in his leg to this day as a constant reminder of the dangers of war;

Whereas, After his hospitalization, First Sergeant Swanson returned to duty. He was awarded a Purple Heart in a ceremony during his deployment in Afghanistan;

Whereas, First Sergeant Swanson awarded his Purple Heart to Leonard Wayne McIntosh posthumously on Wednesday, January 29, 2014, finally conferring upon McIntosh the respect, honor, and gratitude he so richly deserved; and

Whereas, Through his actions, First Sergeant Swanson demonstrated the kind of selfless love, humility, and honor that exemplifies the best of Indiana, thereby setting an example for all Hoosiers to follow: Therefore,

*Be it resolved by the Senate
of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana,
the House of Representatives concurring:*

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly honors Purple Heart recipients First Sergeant Gregory Swanson and World War II veteran Leonard Wayne McIntosh for their service, sacrifice, and courage.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to transmit copies of this resolution to First Sergeant Gregory Swanson and Oaklene McIntosh.

The resolution was read a first time and adopted by voice vote. The Clerk was directed to inform the Senate of the passage of the resolution.

Senate Concurrent Resolution 43

The Speaker handed down Senate Concurrent Resolution 43, sponsored by Representative Negele:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION honoring the National Association of Women Business Owners (NAWBO) during Women's History Month.

Whereas, In 2008, there were more than 10 million women-owned businesses, employing more than 13 million people, and generating \$1.9 trillion in sales;

Whereas, The National Association of Women Business Owners (NAWBO) of Indianapolis has played an intricate role in impacting, influencing, and propelling Indiana into a leading state for women-owned businesses;

Whereas, NAWBO steers women entrepreneurs into economic, social, and political spheres of power worldwide,

strengthening the wealth-creating capacity of its members and promoting economic development within the entrepreneurial community;

Whereas, NAWBO of Indianapolis creates innovative and effective changes in business culture, builds strategic alliances, coalitions, and affiliations, transforms public policy, and influences opinion makers;

Whereas, NAWBO of Indianapolis is the unified voice of America's women-owned businesses and represents the fastest growing segment of the market;

Whereas, NAWBO is being honored during Women's History Month, an international celebration of the extraordinary accomplishments of women that highlights their historical and contemporary contributions to society;

Whereas, Women's History Month has been held annually every March since 1987;

Whereas, The theme for 2014's Women's History Month, declared by the National Women's History Project, is "Celebrating Women of Character, Courage, and Commitment"; and

Whereas, It is the hope of Women's History Month to not only celebrate the history of women, but to also spread HERstory as well: Therefore,

*Be it resolved by the Senate
of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana,
the House of Representatives concurring:*

SECTION 1. The Indiana Senate recognizes the National Association of Women Business Owners (NAWBO) of Indianapolis as not only an economic generator, but a community builder and applauds the organization's accomplishments during Women's History Month on behalf of the State of Indiana.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to transmit copies of the resolution to Tammy Butler Robinson.

The resolution was read a first time and adopted by voice vote. The Clerk was directed to inform the Senate of the passage of the resolution.

Senate Concurrent Resolution 44

The Speaker handed down Senate Concurrent Resolution 44, sponsored by Representative Pelath:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION honoring the Social and Learning Institute.

Whereas, The Social and Learning Institute, located in Michigan City, Indiana, is a unique school that helps mentally and developmentally impaired adults to socialize, and to learn basic life skills in order to lead independent, creative, and productive lives;

Whereas, The Social and Learning Institute has recently completed a 2500 square foot addition to the rear of their current location, which will allow more individuals to participate in their programs;

Whereas, Originally an experimental program at the LaPorte County Therapy Center entitled "Adult Activities Class", the program provided mentally and developmentally handicapped adults with opportunities to grow in their social and learning skills, as well as instilling the special camaraderie of similar handicapped individuals in a safe, nurturing and protected environment from 1973 to 1976;

Whereas, Funding for the program ran out in 1976, but the need for these services did not;

Whereas, Marguerite Gardner, James Guerrucci, the parents of handicapped individuals, and local volunteers worked diligently alongside Senator Anita Bowser to fill this need in the local community by raising funds, passing meaningful legislation, and raising awareness of the issues involved;

Whereas, The tireless advocacy of these individuals has allowed the Social and Learning Institute to expand their services to more members in the community, increasing the number of students from five to twenty-seven over the past thirty-six years; and

Whereas, The new addition to their building will let the Institute provide services and changes the lives of many more handicapped individuals over the next few years: Therefore,

*Be it resolved by the Senate
of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana,
the House of Representatives concurring:*

SECTION 1. The Indiana General Assembly recognizes and thanks the Social and Learning Institute for their valuable contribution to well being of handicapped individuals in the State of Indiana.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to transmit copies of the resolution to James J. Guerrucci and R.A. Gardner.

The resolution was read a first time and adopted by voice vote. The Clerk was directed to inform the Senate of the passage of the resolution.

House Resolution 63

Representative Mahan introduced House Resolution 63:

A HOUSE RESOLUTION congratulating Eleanor Long Organ on the occasion of her 100th birthday.

Whereas, It is truly remarkable to celebrate your 100th birthday;

Whereas, Eleanor Organ knows that joy;

Whereas, Eleanor, the second of six children born to Anna Morrow Gartland and Francis Xavier (Frank) Gartland, was born on March 7, 1914;

Whereas, Except for the months away at St. Mary's of Notre Dame school, Eleanor has lived all 100 years of her life within one square mile in Marion;

Whereas, Eleanor married John (Jay) William Long and together they had nine children, six girls and three boys;

Whereas, Eleanor's life has revolved around her family that includes 27 grandchildren, 27 great-grandchildren with two more on the way and too many nieces and nephews to count;

Whereas, Eleanor's life has been meaningful, generous, kind, courageous, and filled with love, humor, devotion, good sense, and loyalty for those 100 years;

Whereas, A die-hard Irish fan, Eleanor has been at the University of Notre Dame football stadium to watch her beloved Irish play every year for 87 consecutive years;

Whereas, On a chilly night last fall, minutes before the teams ran through their respective tunnels, Eleanor was wheeled onto the field to meet Head Coach Brian Kelly;

Whereas, Coach Kelly came out to the field early to meet Eleanor, who had proven herself to be the definition of a "die-hard fan";

Whereas, They spoke for a while, and she told him that she had prayed many, many rosaries for the Irish through the years;

Whereas, This incredible meeting is one of the highlights of Eleanor's life that has been marked by her loyalty to the boys in blue & gold;

Whereas, Eleanor Long Organ has lived a long and useful life, touching the lives of many along the way; and

Whereas, It is a joy to note the 100th birthday of a lady whose life has had such a positive influence on her community, her state, and her country: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana House of Representatives extends best wishes for a happy birthday to centenarian Eleanor Long Organ on the occasion of her 100th birthday and trusts that she will celebrate many more birthdays in the years to come.

Whereas, Jordan Eickelberger has positively impacted the daily lives of the community and its citizens with an inordinate amount of dedication and commitment;

Whereas, Jordan Eickelberger is congratulated on receiving the 2013 Emerging Philanthropist of the Year by the Orange County Community Foundation: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

The resolution was read a first time and adopted by voice vote.

House Resolution 66

Representatives Price and Burton introduced House Resolution 66:

A HOUSE RESOLUTION recognizing Billy Frank Hendley.

Whereas, Billy Frank Hendley joined the Indiana Army National Guard on April 29, 1956; he served three consecutive enlistments from 1956 -1966, including that of Ordnance Parts Specialist, Ordnance Supply Specialist, both with Headquarters & Company A of the 738th Ordnance Battalion, and Light Truck Driver with Headquarters & Company B of the 38th Aviation Battalion;

Whereas, Mr. Hendley was again activated on January 17, 1965, by Special Orders number 42 Paragraph 13, when Governor Roger D. Branigin called out the Indiana Army National Guard under command of Major General John S. Anderson (The Adjutant General), for a snow emergency that had crippled Indianapolis and vicinity; during his time of service in the Indiana Army National Guard, Mr. Hendley thrice earned the Sharpshooter (Rifle) Badge and, on June 16, 1966, was honorably discharged with 10 years of service and the rank of Sergeant (SP5 E-5);

Whereas, Mr. Hendley spent nine years working for the Military Department of Indiana (USPFO), from 1956 to 1965, as a trades helper, mechanic (jr.), painter, canvas and leather repairman, and automotive repairman, advancing to Level 11 (NGW 11-3) at the end of his tenure with the USPFO;

Whereas, Billy Frank Hendley married the former Marilyn Jo Snyder on November 20, 1959, and of this union were born five children: surviving along with his former wife are Bryan D. Hendley (Star Trucking Co. as a driver) of Franklin, Indiana; Terri L. Webb (bank loans officer) of Franklin, Indiana; Steven W. Hendley, with his mother in the old former IGA store he converted into two apartments, of Providence, Indiana; Timothy H. Hendley (upholstery shop on his farm following in his father's shoes with horses and other animals) of Trafalgar,

Indiana, and Carole M. Ellis (school bus attendant) of Franklin, Indiana;

Whereas, Billy Frank Hendley, with the advice and friendship of Mr. F. (Franklin) Edward Vandivier, later two-term mayor of the city of Franklin, became an entrepreneur. Beginning a rewarding and profitable journey of self employment in 1965, he first owned and managed a Philip 66 service station on U.S. Highway 31 (N. Morton Street) and Bill's Upholstery Shop (S. Main Street) both in Franklin, Indiana. He eventually closed the service station and later moved the upholstery shop to his home. When the business overwhelmed their home, he bought and relocated to an old abandoned former IGA store in the heart of the town of Providence, Indiana. By 1984, outgrowing this site, he leased a very large old two story building in downtown Bargersville, Indiana. He had built a thriving upholstery business into a full-time occupation, and so decided to quit driving a truck for Roadway Express, Inc. (member of Teamsters Local Union number 135), Indianapolis, Indiana, as a "second job" that he had for 18 years (1966-1984). Mr. Hendley was always considerate of his family, and whenever any family, siblings, cousins, etc., were in need of work, Mr. Hendley made every effort to employ them in any way possible in any of his businesses in which he was active at the time;

Whereas, Billy Frank Hendley held the first Hendley Family Reunion at his Banta, Indiana, home in Johnson County on Memorial Day 1972, and the first National Reunion of both branches (Clans) of the Hendley family at his farm near Providence, Indiana, on Memorial Day 1975, an event that established The Hendley Family Association of Tennessee, which was inaugurated into existence on January 1, 1976. That January, Tennessee State Senator Tommy Burks in commemorating this occasion sent an official Tennessee State Flag, which was posted at the family reunion of The Francis Marion Hendley branch (Clan) of The Hendley Family Association that Memorial Day of 1976. Mr. Orvale Hale, alluded to in Senator Tommy Burks' Tennessee Senate Joint Resolution number 128 1989 for his "claw" style playing of the banjo, appeared with his wife at this reunion as well as "Cousin" MISS MINNIE PEARL of the Grand Ole Opry, her letter that she would have come had she gotten enough notice; Minnie Pearl was the Honorary Chairwoman of the Tennessee Monument Commission at the time; and

Whereas, Billy Frank Hendley's funeral service was observed on April 23, 2013, in Franklin, Indiana. The Rev. Max Downs of the Franklin Church of the Nazarene led the funeral sermon "Seeking First His Kingdom & His Righteousness," which exulted Mr. Hendley's life: "It is fitting this afternoon that we allow Billy to preach his own funeral by looking at his obituary and sharing observations for our own lives. His obvious work ethic brings me to challenge: We must be about the Father's business, and a vital part of that obligation is working diligently and faithfully at the vocation to which God had called us forth. Believe that God has a plan for each of our lives and when we find that plan, we are obligated to do our best in that work! Example, if God calls you to be a mechanic, remodeler, trucker, upholsterer ... you can be the best mechanic possible!" and love of country, through his service in the Indiana National Guard: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana House of Representatives recognizes the many accomplishments of Billy Frank Hendley, including his service to the state of Indiana and the United States.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit a copy of this resolution to Billy Frank Hendley and his family.

The resolution was read a first time and adopted by voice vote.

House Resolution 67

Representatives Austin, Forestal, Burton and Clere introduced House Resolution 67:

A HOUSE RESOLUTION urging the Legislative Council to assign to the appropriate study committee the study of the training received by teachers who instruct students diagnosed with a neurological disorder.

Whereas, Neurological disorders are diseases of the central and peripheral nervous system - the brain, spinal cord, cranial nerves, peripheral nerves, nerve roots, autonomic nervous system, neuromuscular junction, and muscles;

Whereas, Structural, biochemical, or electrical abnormalities in the brain, spinal cord, or other nerves can result in a range of symptoms;

Whereas, Hundreds of millions of people are affected by neurological disorders worldwide;

Whereas, Because students with diagnosed neurological disorders may require additional resources and teacher support, appropriate training is required; and

Whereas, Study by the appropriate committee may help determine if teachers receive appropriate training needed to effectively teach students diagnosed with neurological disorders: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana House of Representatives urges the Legislative Council to assign to the appropriate study committee the study of the training received by teachers who instruct students diagnosed with a neurological disorder.

The resolution was read a first time and adopted by voice vote.

House Resolution 68

Representatives Mayfield and Pierce introduced House Resolution 68:

A HOUSE RESOLUTION recognizing the 2013 Indiana University baseball team.

Whereas, The 2013 Indiana University baseball team was a team of firsts;

Whereas, The team was the first to advance to the College World Series in the school's history and the first Big Ten school to do so in 29 years (Michigan 1985);

Whereas, Aaron Slegers was named the Big Ten Pitcher of the Year and was drafted in the fifth round of the Major League Baseball draft by the Minnesota Twins;

Whereas, Head coach Tracy Smith was named the National Coach of the Year by the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association (NCBWA) and collegebaseballinsider.com;

Whereas, Bart Kaufman Field hosted an average attendance of over 1,700 fans per game, ranking in the top 40 nationally; and

Whereas, Outstanding athletic accomplishments such as this deserve special recognition: Therefore,

Whereas, First Lieutenant Lewis Bennett Challis died a hero on August 25, 1944, while serving with the 12th Engineer Combat Battalion, 8th Division;

Whereas, First Lieutenant Challis was killed by a sniper while on patrol in France on Paris Liberation Day and was buried in the Brittany American Cemetery in St. James, France;

Whereas, After 69 years, First Lieutenant Lewis B. Challis is being awarded the Purple Heart, World War II Victory Medal, and the European-African-Middle Eastern Campaign Medal with one Bronze Service Star in recognition of his gallantry in the line of duty;

Whereas, Born in Danzig, Germany (Gdansk, Poland) in 1913, First Lieutenant Lewis B. Challis was the son of Harold Bennett Challis, an American opera singer traveling in Europe;

Whereas, The Challis family escaped Germany in 1917, coming to Peru, Indiana, to live;

Whereas, First Lieutenant Challis attended Peru High School, where he was a member of the Honor's Society, Student Council, and "Narcissus" Yearbook Staff;

Whereas, After graduation, First Lieutenant Challis attended Purdue University, where he initiated in Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity and received a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering;

Whereas, First Lieutenant Challis enlisted in the Army on July 30, 1940, at Fort Sam Houston, Texas;

Whereas, Before leaving for duty overseas, First Lieutenant Challis married Jary Cleveland Challis on April 28, 1941;

Whereas, First Lieutenant Lewis Bennett Challis, like millions of other Americans who have answered their country's call, did not seek personal glory, but instead sought peace and freedom for the future generations of our country; and

Whereas, Bravery such as this deserves to be remembered always: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly remembers the bravery of First Lieutenant Lewis B. Challis and acknowledges his great sacrifice so that our country can remain free.

Senate Concurrent Resolution 45

The Speaker handed down Senate Concurrent Resolution 45, sponsored by Representative Errington:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION honoring Dr. Jo Ann Gora upon her retirement as President of Ball State University.

Whereas, Dr. Jo Ann Gora has served as President of Ball State University since 2004;

Whereas, President Gora is the fourteenth president of the university, and the first woman to serve as president of a public university in Indiana;

Whereas, President Gora quickly demonstrated her commitment to putting students first by declining an inauguration and instead establishing a scholarship fund for 25 high-achieving students;

Whereas, President Gora led the development of Ball State University's "Education Redefined" strategic plan during its implementation from 2007 to 2012;

Whereas, Education Redefined's cornerstone was making immersive learning opportunities available allowing students to impact citizens from every Indiana county, leading to more than 20,800 students completing over 1,250 projects in the last six years while being mentored by faculty across every university academic department;

Whereas, During President Gora's tenure, Ball State saw more than \$520 million worth of campus renovations and facilities construction, including new dormitories, updates to Scheumann Stadium, upgrades to dining halls, and the opening of the David Letterman Communication and Media Building;

Whereas, President Gora commissioned the Geothermal Conversion Project, the nation's largest ground-source, closed-loop district geothermal system, which has created an estimated 2,300 jobs and cut Ball State's carbon footprint in half;

Whereas, Under the leadership of President Gora, fifty-four Ball State academic programs have earned national recognition;

Whereas, President Gora's steadfast commitment to improving Ball State and the local community has earned her many awards, including the Torchbearer, the highest honor from the Indiana Commission on Women;

Whereas, President Gora was named one of the nineteen most influential women in Indiana by the Indianapolis Business Journal;

Whereas, Other notable awards include the Vivian Conley Award for dedication to community contributions, the Walter S. Blackburn Award for her work promoting the Ball State University College of Architecture and Planning Indianapolis Center, and the Mira Trailblazer Award from TechPoint for significant and lasting contributions to technology innovation in Indiana;

Whereas, President Gora has also written two books, was a charter member of the The New York Times/Chronicle of Higher Education cabinet, and served on numerous Boards and Councils, including the American Council on Education's Board of Directors, the Mid-American Conference President's Council, the Governing Boards' Council of Presidents, First Merchants Bank, Ball Memorial Hospital, the Indiana Chamber of Commerce, and was the immediate past chair of the Central Indiana Corporate Partnership;

Whereas, President Gora has made outstanding advancements in the academic and social foundations of Ball State University, and her departure will be greatly missed by students, faculty, and the local community alike: Therefore,

Senate Concurrent Resolution 41

The Speaker handed down Senate Concurrent Resolution 41, sponsored by Representatives Price and Burton:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION memorializing Billy Frank Hendley.

Whereas, Billy Frank Hendley was born May 31, 1938, in Hillsdale, Macon County, Tennessee. He was the eldest son and second child of ten children born to Wilbur J. Hendley, Sr., and Ida May Taylor. Hendley was named jointly for his great uncle William "Billy" Bird Hendley and great grandfather Francis "Frank" M. Hendley, both natives of Putnam County, Tennessee;

Whereas, Billy Frank Hendley moved with his family to the Bill Douglas Farm just off State Road 252 in Nineveh Township in southern Johnson County, Indiana in July of 1942. There, Hendley began his education, attending several schools during his educational endeavors;

Whereas, Billy Frank Hendley joined the Indiana Army National Guard as a volunteer on April 29, 1956, where he served three consecutive enlistments from 1956 through 1966. Hendley served as an Ordnance Parts Specialist, Ordnance Supply Specialist, both with Headquarters and Company A of the 738th Ordnance Battalion, and Light Truck Driver with Headquarters and Company B of the 38th Aviation Battalion;

Whereas, Billy Frank Hendley comes from a family rich in military service, with family members having served for both the Confederacy and Union during the American Civil War;

Whereas, In 1962, Billy Frank Hendley had the distinct honor of enrolling in the United States Army Quartermasters School at Fort Lee, Virginia. During his tenure there, Hendley obtained a superior rating and was named an honor graduate from the canvas and webbed equipment repair course;

Whereas, Billy Frank Hendley spent nine years from 1956 to 1965 working for the Military Department of Indiana in the United States Property and Fiscal Office (USPFO) as a trades helper, junior mechanic, painter, canvas and leather repairman, and automotive repairman. By the end of his tenure with the USPFO, Hendley had advanced to Level 11 (NGW 11-3);

Whereas, In addition to his skills as a quartermaster, Billy Frank Hendley was also an excellent marksman, earning the Sharpshooter (Rifle) Badge three times. Hendley was honorably discharged from the Indiana Army National Guard on June 16, 1966, after ten years of service. Hendley attained the rank of sergeant;

Whereas, Billy Frank Hendley married Marilyn Jo Snyder on November 20, 1959, and of this union were born five children: Bryan D. Hendley, Steven W. Hendley, Timothy H. Hendley, Terri L. Webb, and Carole M. Ellis;

Whereas, Billy Frank Hendley, with the advice, counsel, and friendship of Mr. F. Edward Vandivier (future two-term mayor of Franklin, Indiana) embarked on his entrepreneurial journey. Hendley began his rewarding and profitable journey of self-employment in 1965. He first owned and managed a Phillips 66 service station and Bill's Upholstery Shop, both in Franklin, Indiana. Hendley eventually closed the service station and later moved the upholstery shop to his home. Hendley's business quickly outgrew his family's home, and he soon bought and relocated the business to an old, abandoned IGA store in the heart of Providence, Indiana. By 1984, Hendley's business had again outgrown its building, and Hendley began leasing a large, two-story building in downtown Bargersville, Indiana. Having built his upholstery business into a thriving, full-time occupation, Hendley decided to quit his "second job" as a truck driver for Roadway Express, Inc. that he had held for eighteen years, from 1966 through 1984. Hendley was always considerate of his family members, making every effort to employ family members in need of work in any way possible in any of his businesses that he was active with at the time of the family member's need;

Whereas, Billy Frank Hendley held the first Hendley family reunion at his Banta, Johnson County, Indiana home on Memorial Day 1972, and the first national reunion of both branches (clans) of the Hendley family at his farm near Providence, Indiana, on Memorial Day 1975. At this event, The Hendley Family Association of Tennessee was established, and the Association officially came into existence on January 1, 1976;

Whereas, Billy Frank Hendley played a crucial role in the establishment and success of The Hendley Family Association, serving on the first board of directors of the Association from 1976 to 1977, hosting the first reunion of the Francis Marion Hendley Clan (branch) of the Association, was an honorary signatory of the Association's incorporation charter, and served as the second national president and first native Tennessean of The Hendley Family Association, Inc. of Tennessee from 1978 to 1979. Hendley was also elected to the first board of directors for the Francis Marion Hendley Clan (branch) of The Hendley Family Association, Inc., serving from 2003 to September 23, 2007, when he was again elected to the national board of directors of The Hendley Family Association, Inc. Hendley

served in that capacity from his election on September 23, 2007 until his passing on April 20, 2013;

Whereas, Billy Frank Hendley was presented the President's Award plaque, fashioned in the shape of the State of Tennessee, for his sponsorship of the first three Hendley reunions by the first National President, Francis "Frank" M. Hendley, II of The Hendley Family Association, Inc. on May 31, 1977. He was presented the President's Award of Merit plaque for his dedication to The Hendley Family Association by National President William H. Hendley on May 31, 1982;

Whereas, Four of Billy Frank Hendley's children have been involved in the governance of The Hendley Family Association, Inc. Hendley's eldest son, Bryan, is a former member of the board of directors, having served from 1982 to 2001, his eldest daughter, Terri L. Webb, has been serving as national secretary since 1982, his youngest son, Timothy, is a current member of the board of directors, serving since 2001, and his youngest daughter, Carole M. Ellis, has served as assistant national secretary since 1989;

Whereas, Billy Frank Hendley once rescued two horses from abuse in Brown County, Indiana, adding them to the many other animals he kept on his farm near Providence, Indiana. Hendley sought to instill a sense of responsibility in his children at a young age by having his children care for the horses and many other animals on the family's farm;

Whereas, Billy Frank Hendley was active in his community and participated in numerous civic organizations, including Eli Lilly American Legion Post #374 of Indianapolis, the Tennessee Monument Commission, Inc., the Confederate High Command re-enactment group, the Indiana-Tennessee Civil War Memorial Commission, the White River Valley Region's Antique Car Club of America, and the Johnson County Association for Retarded Citizens at the Gateway Learning Center in Franklin, Indiana;

Whereas, Even after his retirement in 2000, Billy Frank Hendley remained active in his hobbies and in the lives of his children. He continued collecting and restoring classic cars for the antique car club of which he was a member, and at various times helped out his son Timothy, who had taken over the family upholstery business. One project of particular note was a donation of cushions made for the pews at the old World War II P.O.W. chapel museum at the U.S. Army post, Camp Atterbury, in Edinburgh, Indiana in southeast Johnson County. Hendley also began a tradition of housing renovation, which he and his children carried on for twelve years until the time of Hendley's passing;

Whereas, Billy Frank Hendley was the recipient of numerous awards and honors for his public service and community involvement, including being appointed an honorary delegate by Congressman William Hill "Bill" Boner and Colonel Aide-de-Camp to Governor Lamar Alexander, being awarded the National Guard Lapel Pin from Indiana Adjutant General Carl G. Farrell, the Honorary Lieutenant Governor Citation from Indiana Lieutenant Governor (and later Governor) Frank O'Bannon, the National Guard Medal by the Department of Indiana American Legion Commander Jim Koutz, the Governor's Outstanding Tennessean Award from Governor Ned R. McWherter, the Cold War Certificate of Recognition from Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld, the Honorary Lieutenant Governor Citation from Indiana Lieutenant Governor (and later Governor) Joseph E. Kernan, and posthumously the National Defense Service Medal by the Indiana Joint Forces Headquarters, Indiana National Guard;

Whereas, Billy Frank Hendley's funeral service was observed on April 23, 2013 at the Flinn & McGuire Funeral Home in Franklin, Indiana, and officiated by the Reverend Max Downs

of the Franklin Church of the Nazarene;

Whereas, Billy Frank Hendley was laid to rest the following day, April 24, 2013, at 11:00 a.m. at East Hill Cemetery in Morgantown, Morgan County, Indiana. Mr. William H. Hendley, Mr. Justin Webb, Mr. Brandon Moorefield, Mr. Logan Hendley, Mr. Randy "Hick" Rodgers, and Mr. Shawn Gilley served as pallbearers;

Whereas, Billy Frank Hendley is survived by his wife and five children, as well as eight grandchildren, Stephanie Webb, Justin Webb, Kristin Moorefield, Austin Hendley, Logan Hendley, Madison Hendley, and Morgan Hendley, and one great grandchild, Andre Webb. Hendley also leaves behind five sisters, Louise Burgdolf, Susie McClusky, Sara Hendley, Mary Rodgers, and Lilly Eisenmenger, three brothers, Walter, Wilbur Jr., and Ray. Hendley's youngest sister, Margie Ward, preceded him in passing. Hendley is also survived by a half sister, Pandora Hendley Reagan, two half brothers, Calvin and Randall Hendley, and a step brother, Harold Clay Ray;

Whereas, Billy Frank Hendley's family received condolence letters from Tennessee Governor Bill Haslem and his wife Crissy, Indiana Governor Michael R. Pence, Virginia Governor Robert F. McDonnell and his wife Maureen, and Brigadier General John E. O'Neil, IV, Commandant, United States Army Quartermaster School, Fort Lee, Virginia, all of which are indicative of the esteem in which Hendley was held; and

Whereas, Billy Frank Hendley lived up to the highest merits and traditions of his Tennessee heritage and also exemplified what it means to be a Hoosier. Hendley lived the motto of The Hendley Family Association, Inc., taken from the late former Governor Ned R. McWherter's first inaugural address on January 17, 1987 when he said "It is appropriate today that we pause to remember who we are, where we came from, and what we have been taught." Hendley also carried on the ethics and morals of his great-great grandmother, Elizabeth Jane Gentry-Hendley, the "Mother of the Great Hendley Family of Tennessee," as Hendley truly was a "friend to all": Therefore,
