RESOLUTIONS ON FIRST READING

Senate Resolution 22

Senate Resolution 22, introduced by Senator Breaux:

A SENATE RESOLUTION urging the Legislative Council to assign to a study committee the recommendations found in the "Enhancing the Use of Health Information Technology in Indiana" report.

Whereas, P.L. 52-2014 required that the Indiana State Department of Health and the Office of the Secretary of Family and Social Services form a workgroup to study 10 specified areas of health information technology in Indiana;

Whereas, The workgroup created the report "Enhancing the Use of Health Information Technology in Indiana" that contained various recommendations; and

Whereas, A summer study committee could analyze the recommendations found in this report and consider the best ways to implement its recommendations into legislative initiatives: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana Senate urges the Legislative Council to assign to a study committee the recommendations found in the "Enhancing the Use of Health Information Technology in Indiana" report.

The resolution was read in full and referred to the Committee on Health & Provider Services.

House Concurrent Resolution 19

House Concurrent Resolution 19, sponsored by Senator Houchin:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION requesting the Indiana Department of Transportation to identify portions of certain highways between the Indiana - Ohio border near Lawrenceburg in Dearborn County and the Indiana - Illinois border near Mt. Vernon in Posey County as the Ohio River Scenic Byway.

Whereas, The Ohio River Scenic Byway, located in Southern Indiana, is a Nationally Designated Scenic Byway and covers many miles of historic significance and beautiful terrain;

Whereas, The communities along the Ohio River desire to share their history and the splendor of the area with visitors throughout Indiana and the nation; and

Whereas, The route described in Resolution 47 of the 107th Session of the Indiana General Assembly needs to be changed so as to remain consistent with the Federally Designated Route and with the Indiana Department of Transportation signage for the

Byway, that was placed by the Federally Designated Route described in the Corridor Management Plan for the Byway: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly requests the Indiana Department of Transportation redesignate the following course of highways in Southern Indiana as the "Ohio River Scenic Byway". In Newburgh, take State Road 662 west to Interstate 69 (formerly Interstate 164), Interstate 69 West which turns into Veterans Memorial Parkway, then Riverside Drive in Evansville. Turn left (west) on State Road 62 (Lloyd Expressway) in Evansville and proceed west through Mt. Vernon to the Indiana - Illinois border. This redesignation follows the continuation of the existing Ohio River Scenic Byway as detailed in previous resolutions and in the Corridor Management Plan.

SECTION 2. That the administrative matters of the Ohio River Scenic Byway be joined with the Indiana State Byways Advisory Committee, formed in 1997 by an Interagency Agreement. This will make the Ohio River Scenic Byway consistent with the other Indiana Byways. It will also update the process of making future changes to the Byway by Declaration, rather than Resolution.

The resolution was read in full and referred to the Committee on Homeland Security & Transportation.

House Concurrent Resolution 23

House Concurrent Resolution 23, sponsored by Senator Houchin:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION urging the Indiana Department of Transportation to rename that part of Indiana State Road 56 and U.S. Highway 150 that converge as a single roadway between Paoli and French Lick as the Orange County Veterans Memorial Highway and the bridge spanning Lick Creek at U.S. 150 and East State Road 56 be designated the Orange County Vietnam Veterans Bridge.

Whereas, There are 1,625 veterans residing in Orange County;

Whereas, These Orange County veterans served in World War II, Korea, Vietnam, Grenada, and Desert Storm;

Whereas, The General Assembly recognizes the great sacrifices made by these Orange County veterans in the service of their state and country in time of war;

Whereas, These veterans deserve our respect and admiration for the duties they performed during times of aggression against

our country;

Whereas, Many states, including Indiana, have designated and named parts of a state or federal highway as a memorial to those who served our nation in time of war;

Whereas, Since America has relied upon her veterans in times of war to protect our way of life, it seems only just and proper that America honor the veterans of all her wars;

Whereas, Throughout the history of our country dedicated and courageous soldiers have given their lives in support of our freedom;

Whereas, The war in Vietnam was our nation's longest war;

Whereas, The state of Indiana had 187,600 men and women who served in the Vietnam war;

Whereas, 1,534 men and women from Indiana were killed in action during the war in Vietnam;

Whereas, The veterans of the war in Vietnam fought in an unpopular war and have become our country's unknown veterans, often receiving very little respect for the sacrifices they have made for their country;

Whereas, When the veterans returned home, they often did not receive the welcome they deserved;

Whereas, The Vietnam veterans deserve our respect and admiration for the duties they performed during the war in Vietnam; and

Whereas, It is, therefore, fitting that the proper signage be placed along that part of Indiana State Road 56 and U.S. Highway 150 that converge as a single roadway between Paoli and French Lick to recognize the designation of that part of the highway as the Orange County Veterans Memorial Highway and that the bridge spanning Lick Creek at U.S. 150 and East State Road 56 be named the Orange County Vietnam Veterans Bridge: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly urges the Indiana Department of Transportation to rename that part of Indiana State Road 56 and U.S. Highway 150 that converge as a single roadway between Paoli and French Lick as the Orange County Veterans Memorial Highway and that the bridge spanning Lick Creek at U.S. 150 and East State Road 56 be named the Orange County Vietnam Veterans Bridge.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives transmit a copy of this resolution to the commissioner of the Indiana Department of Transportation and the Orange County Veterans Service Office.

The resolution was read in full and referred to the Committee on Homeland Security & Transportation.

RESOLUTIONS ON SECOND READING

Senate Resolution 3

Senator Steele called up Senate Resolution 3 for second reading. The resolution was read a second time and adopted by voice vote.

ENGROSSED JOINT RESOLUTIONS ON THIRD READING

Engrossed Senate Joint Resolution 12

Senator Steele called up Engrossed Senate Joint Resolution 12 for third reading:

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Article 1 of the Constitution of the State of Indiana by adding a new section concerning farming and ranching.

Be it resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. The following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Indiana is proposed and agreed to by this, the One Hundred Nineteenth General Assembly of the State of Indiana, and is referred to the next General Assembly for reconsideration and agreement.

SECTION 2. ARTICLE 1 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF INDIANA IS AMENDED BY ADDING A NEW SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS: **Section 40. (a) The people of Indiana desire to:**

(1) protect the rights of ownership of property and the adequate production of food, fuel, fiber, and shelter, while maintaining the common law; and

(2) promote agriculture as a central activity to be conducted in Indiana, and to maintain agriculture as a vital economic activity serving as a foundation and stabilizing force of Indiana's economy.

(b) The right of the people of Indiana to engage in diverse farming and ranching practices is guaranteed by this Constitution.

(c) The General Assembly may not pass a law that unreasonably abridges the right of farmers and ranchers to employ or refuse to employ effective agricultural technology and livestock production and ranching practices.

(d) This section does not modify any:

(1) provision of the common law;

(2) statute relating to trespass or eminent domain; or
(3) other property right, existing or previously enacted statute, or existing or previously adopted administrative rule.

Be it resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. The following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Indiana is proposed and agreed to by this, the One Hundred Nineteenth General Assembly of the State of Indiana, and is referred to the next General Assembly for reconsideration and agreement.

SECTION 2. ARTICLE 10, SECTION 5 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF INDIANA IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS: Section 5. **(a) No law shall authorize any debt to be contracted, on behalf of the State, except in the following cases: to meet casual deficits in the revenue; to pay the interest on the State Debt; to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, or, if hostilities be threatened, provide for the public defense.**

(b) The following definitions apply to this section only for purposes of the limits on the State budget under this section:

(1) "Revenue" means all income received by the State and all other State funds, excluding:

(A) the proceeds of bonds or other loans; and

(B) the balances and income of any trust funds of the State.

(2) "Expense" means the ordinary operating costs of State government, including any debt service payments made during the budget period and the costs necessary to:

(A) actuarially fund the accrued liabilities for employees' pension benefits; and

(B) fully fund the liability for any cost of living increases or other increases or supplements authorized during the budget period for pension benefits.

(c) Subject to subsection (d), the total amount of expense appropriations enacted by the General Assembly for a budget period may not exceed the estimated revenue of the State, as determined by law, during the budget period. The requirement under this subsection may be suspended if at least two-thirds of the members of the House of Representatives and at least two-thirds of the members of the Senate vote to suspend the requirement.

(d) This subsection applies if before the end of a budget period it is estimated, as determined by law, that the revenue of the State during the budget period will be less than the amount of expense appropriations enacted for that budget period. If this subsection applies, the total amount of expense appropriations enacted by the General Assembly for the following budget period may not exceed the sum of:

- (1) the estimated revenue of the State, as determined by law, during the following budget period; minus
- (2) the amount by which the expense appropriations made for the current budget period exceed the estimated revenue of the State in the current budget period.

The requirement under this subsection may be suspended if at least two-thirds of the members of the House of Representatives and at least two-thirds of the members of the Senate vote to suspend the requirement.

(e) A State budget enacted by the General Assembly must appropriate money for the State's pension funds in the amount necessary to:

- (1) actuarially fund the accrued liability of all such pension funds during the budget period; and
- (2) fully fund the liability for any cost of living increases or other increases or supplements authorized during the budget period for pension benefits.

(f) All expenses that are expected to be incurred by the State during the budget period must be included in the State budget.

(g) A court that orders a remedy pursuant to any case or controversy arising under this section may not order any remedies other than a declaratory judgment or such other remedies that are specifically authorized by the General Assembly in a law implementing this section.
