RESOLUTIONS ON FIRST READING

House Resolution 4

Representative Judy introduced House Resolution 4:

A HOUSE RESOLUTION urging the legislative council to assign to the appropriate committee the topic of lowering the state income tax level to 3.07 percent.

Whereas, The system of taxation in the state of Indiana is a very large and complex body of law;

Whereas, Americans today pay more taxes than at any other time in the nation's history; and

Whereas, Further study of this issue will benefit all Hoosiers: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the legislative council is urged to assign to the appropriate committee the topic of lowering the state income tax level to 3.07 percent.

The resolution was read a first time and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

House Resolution 5

Representative Judy introduced House Resolution 5:

A HOUSE RESOLUTION urging the legislative council to assign to the appropriate committee the topic of Fair Tax at the state level.

Whereas, The current tax system is considered by many to be complex, unfair, and prohibitive to saving, investment, and job creation;

Whereas, The Fair Tax plan is a sales tax proposal to replace the current income tax structure;

Whereas, A federal Fair Tax plan abolishes all personal and corporate income taxes and all taxes on gifts, estates, capital gains, alternative minimums, Social Security, Medicare, and self-employment; and

Whereas, Indiana has shown a commitment to reduce taxes in the past, so further study of a Fair Tax plan at the state level might benefit Hoosiers: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the legislative council is urged to assign to the appropriate committee the topic of Fair Tax at the state level.

The resolution was read a first time and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

House Resolution 6

Representatives Aylesworth and C. Brown introduced House Resolution 6:

A HOUSE RESOLUTION concerning the motor vehicle inspection and maintenance programs in Lake and Porter counties.

Whereas, The motor vehicle inspection and maintenance (I/M) programs in Lake and Porter counties were mandated by the federal Clean Air Act Amendments of 1990, based on Lake and Porter counties' designation as "nonattainment", along with northeast Indiana and southeast Wisconsin, under the one-hour ozone standard;

Whereas, According to the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), cars and trucks collectively are the single greatest contributor to ground-level ozone, the major component of smog;

Whereas, The purpose of an I/M program is to reduce ground-level ozone by ensuring that the emission control systems on vehicles are working correctly;

Whereas, Generally, only vehicles registered in Lake and Porter counties are subject to the I/M programs in Lake and Porter counties;

Whereas, Lake and Porter counties in northwest Indiana are intersected by Interstate Highway 80/90 and Interstate Highway 94, two of the most heavily traveled highways in the Midwest, and Lake County is also intersected by Interstate Highway 65, another heavily traveled highway, linking major southern cities with Indianapolis and Chicago;

Whereas, The citizens of Lake and Porter counties have been burdened with the cost of the testing and remediation required under the I/M program, even though thousands of out-of-state vehicles pass through these areas on a daily basis without the burden of submitting to the I/M program;

Whereas, Lake and Porter counties are linked to the Chicago Nonattainment Area based on violations in northeast Illinois and southeast Wisconsin;

Whereas, Under the standards promulgated in 2015 for ozone, nine monitors within the Chicago Nonattainment Area exceed the standard, but none of the monitors are located in Indiana; and

Whereas, Lake and Porter counties have the most stringent suite of control measures in the Midwest, and have consistently met EPA's objectives; Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana House of Representatives urges the Honorable Donald J. Trump, President of the United States, the Honorable Michael R. Pence, Vice President of the United States, and members of the United States Congress from Indiana to instruct the Environmental Protection Agency to

remove Lake and Porter counties from the Chicago Nonattainment Area, and thereby eliminate the requirements under which the motor vehicle inspection and maintenance programs in Lake and Porter counties are operated.

SECTION 2. That copies of this resolution be transmitted by the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives to the Honorable Donald J. Trump, President of the United States; the Honorable Michael R. Pence, Vice President of the United States; the Honorable Joe Donnelly, the Honorable Todd Young, the Honorable Pete Visclosky, the Honorable Jackie Walorski, the Honorable Jim Banks, the Honorable Todd Rokita, the Honorable Susan Brooks, the Honorable Luke Messer, the Honorable Andre Carson, the Honorable Larry Bucshon, and the Honorable Trey Hollingsworth of the U.S. Congress; Scott Pruitt, the Administrator of the United States Environmental Protection Agency; and Robert A. Kaplan, the Acting Regional Administrator for EPA Region 5 in Chicago.

The resolution was read a first time and referred to the Committee on Roads and Transportation.

House Resolution 7

Representative Eberhart introduced House Resolution 7:

A HOUSE RESOLUTION urging Governor Holcomb to recognize September as Brain Aneurysm Awareness Month.

Whereas, A brain aneurysm, also referred to as a cerebral aneurysm or intracranial aneurysm, is a weak bulging spot on the wall of a brain artery;

Whereas, Although relatively uncommon, ruptured aneurysms are very serious and usually associated with a high mortality rate and disability;

Whereas, The blood flow within the artery pounds against the thinned portion of the wall, and bulging spots form that begin to swell outward;

Whereas, Pressure may cause this aneurysm to rupture, allowing blood to escape into the space around the brain, which usually requires advanced surgical treatment;

Whereas, Survivors of brain aneurysms face many challenges on their road to recovery, including physical challenges, emotional challenges, depression, and potential deficits;

Whereas, Only through knowledge and understanding will we be better able to help survivors and ensure that all of their rights are protected; and

Whereas, It is critical that we help raise awareness of brain aneurysms, including methods of early detection and treatment: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana House urges the governor to recognize September as Brain Aneurysm Awareness Month to raise awareness and better help survivors.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit copies of this resolution to Governor Eric Holcomb, the Brain Aneurysm Foundation, and Raymond Morefield.

The resolution was read a first time and adopted by voice vote.

House Concurrent Resolution 12

Representative Pelath introduced House Concurrent Resolution 12:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION honoring Allan Gilbert Whitlow.

Whereas, Allan Gilbert Whitlow was born on January 4, 1939, in Michigan City and died on November 19, 2017, at his home in Michigan City;

Whereas, At the time of his death, Allan Whitlow was 78 years old;

Whereas, Allan Whitlow and Patricia married on August 26, 1961, in Michigan City;

Whereas, Allan Whitlow graduated from Saint Joseph's College in 1961 and received a master's degree in arts from Michigan State in 1971;

Whereas, Allan Whitlow served his state and his community as a city councilman and as a teacher, assistant principal, principal, assistant superintendent, superintendent, insurance agent, and a former director of the Michigan City Boys and Girls Club chapter;

Whereas, Allan Whitlow was also an assistant coach of the Michigan City Elston High School boys basketball team that won the 1966 Indiana state championship;

Whereas, In 2006, Allan Whitlow was given the humanitarian of the year award for his "generous contributions, commitment of time, support, and inspirations to the city of Michigan City and its citizens";

Whereas, Allan Whitlow was a tremendous asset to Michigan City, and his dedication, perseverance, passion, kindness, and unpretentious attitude helped to improve the lives of everyone he touched; and

Whereas, The death of Allan Gilbert Whitlow left a void in his community and his state that will never be filled: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the members of the Indiana General Assembly express their sincere condolences and appreciation to the family of Allan Gilbert Whitlow for his many contributions and dedicated service to the citizens of Michigan City and the state of Indiana.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit a copy of this resolution to the family of Allan Gilbert Whitlow.

The resolution was read a first time and adopted by voice vote. The Clerk was directed to inform the Senate of the passage of the resolution. Senate sponsor: Senator Tallian.

House Concurrent Resolution 13

Representative Zent introduced House Concurrent Resolution 13:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION recognizing the town of Fremont, Indiana, on the occasion of the 150th anniversary of its incorporation.

Whereas, The town of Fremont is celebrating the 150 year anniversary of its incorporation in 2017;

Whereas, Originally settled as Willow Prairie, the name was changed to Brockville in 1835 and, ultimately, to Fremont in 1851;

Whereas, Fremont was named after John C. Fremont, an American military officer, explorer, U.S. senator, and politician, who was a candidate for the office of president of the United States in 1856;

Whereas, Fremont began its days as a grain center along the Vistula Road that ran from Fort Duquesne (Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania) to Green Bay, Wisconsin, and once boasted two hotels, six passenger trains, and four daily freight trains;

Whereas, Fremont continued to progress with the first school being built in 1845 to serve the children of the community, electric light operation began in 1897, the Fremont Volunteer Fire Department received its first motorized fire equipment in 1914, and the Fremont Public Library was organized in 1919;

Whereas, This community has seen many changes over the years to accommodate the needs and wants of the expanding population;

Whereas, Fremont continues to evolve but strives to maintain that small town feel where neighbors help neighbors and the community develops its spiritual, educational, and social interests; and

Whereas, Fremont has flourished and continued to grow due to the great people who have lived, worked, and raised families in the town and who have served the community through public service over the past 150 years;

Whereas, It is fitting that the town of Fremont and its citizens be accorded special recognition: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the members of the Indiana General Assembly support the citizens of Fremont, Indiana, on the occasion of the 150th anniversary of the founding of the town.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit a copy of this resolution to the Fremont Town Council.

The resolution was read a first time and adopted by voice vote. The Clerk was directed to inform the Senate of the passage of the resolution. Senate sponsor: Senator Glick.

House Concurrent Resolution 14

Representatives Lucas, Frye and Goodin introduced House Concurrent Resolution 14:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION urging the commissioner of the Indiana Department of Transportation to rename the section of U.S. Highway 50 and Jennings County Road 150 N. on the west side of North Vernon to just off the old U.S. Highway 50 on the east side as it approaches the Muscatatuck River as the "Officer Anthony Burton and Reserve Officer Lonnie Howard Memorial Highway".

Whereas, On March 24, 1993, two North Vernon police officers were killed when their cruiser was rammed by a man who was free on bond following an earlier standoff with police;

Whereas, The officers were Officer Anthony Burton and Reserve Officer Lonnie Howard;

Whereas, The officers' car was pushed nearly 100 feet through a ditch, coming to rest at the current site of the State Road 750 bypass that is to be renamed U.S. Highway 50;

Whereas, It is fitting that the people of Indiana honor the memory of Officer Anthony Burton and Reserve Officer Lonnie Howard; and

Whereas, The sacrifice made by Officer Burton and Reserve Officer Howard shall never be forgotten: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly acknowledges the great sacrifice made by Officer Anthony Burton and Reserve Officer Lonnie Howard.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit a copy of this resolution to the

families of Officer Anthony Burton and Reserve Officer Lonnie Howard and the commissioner of the Indiana Department of Transportation.

The resolution was read a first time and referred to the Committee on Roads and Transportation.

House Concurrent Resolution 15

Representatives Bartlett, Errington, Wright, Olthoff and Siegrist introduced House Concurrent Resolution 15:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION recognizing National Human Trafficking Awareness Day 2018.

Whereas, National Human Trafficking Awareness Day is observed on January 11 each year;

Whereas, In 2011 President Barack Obama issued a Presidential Proclamation designating each January to be National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month;

Whereas, The anniversary of this proclamation became known as National Human Trafficking Awareness Day;

Whereas, Even though slavery was abolished by the Thirteenth Amendment in 1865, it still exists in our country today;

Whereas, The United States is the source, transit, and destination country for modern slaves who could be children, women, or men;

Whereas, These people could be foreign nationals or American citizens, but each of them is subjected to the injustices of human trafficking including sex trafficking, forced labor, involuntary servitude, forced marriage, and debt bondage; and

Whereas, The observance of National Human Trafficking Awareness Day helps to bring awareness to this terrible crime; and, therefore, bring it to an end: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly recognizes the existence of National Human Trafficking Awareness Day and urges all Hoosiers to do all they can to prevent this heinous crime.

The resolution was read a first time and adopted by voice vote. The Clerk was directed to inform the Senate of the passage of the resolution. Senate sponsor: Senator Merritt.

House Concurrent Resolution 16

Representatives Negele, Austin, Engleman, Errington, Hamilton, Kirchhofer, Klinker, Macer, McNamara, Olthoff, Pryor, Richardson, Schaibley, Siegrist, Sullivan, Summers, Wright and Ziemke introduced House Concurrent Resolution 16:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION urging the recognition of January 2018 as Cervical Cancer Screening and Awareness Month.

Whereas, Nearly 13,000 women are diagnosed with cervical cancer each year in the United States, and more than 4,000 die as a result;

Whereas, In Indiana, over 250 women are diagnosed with cervical cancer each year, and every three days a woman dies as a result;

Whereas, Cervical cancer is almost 100 percent preventable, yet many are unaware that steps can be taken to prevent the disease through education, prevention, and screening;

Whereas, Mortality from cervical cancer is associated with being diagnosed at a later stage, which often stems from poor access to preventative services and a lack of follow-up care after an abnormal screening; and

Whereas, Awareness of cervical cancer, its risk factors, and the importance of access to preventative measures are critical to perpetuating the continual decrease of the incidence of cervical cancer in women in Indiana and across the nation: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly urges the recognition of January 2018 as Cervical Cancer Screening and Awareness Month in the hope that this recognition will encourage prompt access to preventative services and high-quality medical care and treatment in order to overcome existing barriers to care for all women.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit a copy of this resolution to the governor's office, the commissioner of the Indiana State Department of Health, and the secretary of the Indiana Family and Social Services Administration.

The resolution was read a first time and adopted by voice vote. The Clerk was directed to inform the Senate of the passage of the resolution. Senate sponsor: Senator Leising.

House Concurrent Resolution 17

Representative Zent introduced House Concurrent Resolution 17:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION honoring the Prairie Heights International Thespian Troupe #7436.

Whereas, The Prairie Heights International Thespian Troupe #7436 in LaGrange reaches out to the community in many ways, including its participation in Adopt-A-Highway and maintenance of a section of U.S. Highway 20 and its staging of the annual "haunted theatre" event to raise funds and during which the Troupe secured 360 pounds of food for the Clothes and Food Basket of LaGrange County Inc. for those in need;

Whereas, At Christmas time, the Prairie Heights International Thespian Troupe #7436 purchased clothing, gifts, and other items for families in the community and school who could not acquire these things on their own, and gathered items for "Operation Christmas" boxes and sent those out to children;

Whereas, The Troupe also volunteered to walk dogs and visit animals at the local humane shelters and volunteered with the local baton competition to run sound and concessions, aid judges, and help with management of the event;

Whereas, Troupe #7436 helped host a local "Ladies Day Out", a crafts fair and get-together, for local women;

Whereas, Locally the Troupe advocates for the arts, holding three main stage shows a year, including everyone from the school and bringing the community together, participates in "Theatre In Our Schools Month" in March, and often posts facts around the school, broadcasting them on the school television channel to raise awareness about the benefits of the arts in school;

Whereas, Troupe #7436 also presents a free production at the school's Heritage Festival, performs a free show at the county fair and a free variety show for the community at a local restaurant, and began a theatre program for middle school children where many high school students provide assistance backstage or volunteer as acting, dancing, and singing coaches;

Whereas, Troupe #7436 is very successful and has given many students incredible opportunities;

Whereas, Multiple students from the troupe have been elected as Indiana Thespians officers, students who served as part of the Indiana Thespians board, technical theatre teams from the Troupe have competed at the International Thespian Festival, placing fourth and fifth in the nation, and two students placed first at the International Thespian Festival in the props technical event;

Whereas, One Troupe member was a candidate for the International Thespian officer position, one of 10 students in the nation chosen to compete for the position; and

Whereas, Outstanding accomplishments such as these deserve special recognition: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly recognizes the many accomplishments and contributions made by the Prairie Heights International Thespian Troupe #7436 and urges its members to continue the good work.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit a copy of this resolution to the Prairie Heights International Thespian Troupe #7436.

The resolution was read a first time and adopted by voice vote. The Clerk was directed to inform the Senate of the passage of the resolution. Senate sponsor: Senator Glick.

House Concurrent Resolution 18

Representatives Frye, Goodin, Lucas, Baird, Gutwein and Judy introduced House Concurrent Resolution 18:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION urging the Commissioner of the Indiana Department of Transportation to rename that segment of U.S. Highway 421 from the Jefferson/Ripley County line to the junction of U.S. Highway 421 and State Road 62 the "Major Samuel Woodfill Memorial Highway".

Whereas, Major Samuel Woodfill, a native of Jefferson County, was the only Hoosier to be awarded the Medal of Honor during World War I;

Whereas, A veteran of the Philippine-American War, World War I, and World War II, Major Woodfill served his country for more than 40 years;

Whereas, Major Woodfill was one of the most decorated American servicemen during World War I, receiving the Medal of Honor, the French Croix de Guerre with Palm, the Cross of Prince Danilo, and Italy's Meriot di Guerra, and was made a Chevalier of the French Legion of Honor;

Whereas, Major Woodfill was lauded as "the greatest American Soldier of the World War" by General John Pershing, the Commander of the American Expeditionary Forces during World War I;

Whereas, On October 12, 1918, Major Woodfill and his regiment encountered heavy machine gun fire from the Germans at Cunel, France;

Whereas, Major Woodfill reached machine gun bunkers three times, killing or capturing German soldiers each time;

Whereas, As a result of their great bravery, Major Woodfill and his men suffered for years from the effects of mustard gas used during World War I;

Whereas, As further recognition of his renown, Major Woodfill was asked to serve as a pallbearer at the burial of the

Unknown Soldier during the 1921 dedication ceremonies at Arlington National Cemetery and as a pallbearer for General Pershing in 1948;

Whereas, Major Woodfill was born on January 6, 1883, in Bryantsburg, the son of John H. Woodfill, a veteran of the Mexican-American War and the Civil War;

Whereas, Major Woodfill attended school at Belleview, enlisted in the 11th Infantry of the United States Army on March 8, 1901, and was later buried in Arlington National Cemetery; and

Whereas, Great bravery and heroism deserve special recognition: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly urges the Indiana Department of Transportation to rename the section of U.S. Highway 421 from the Jefferson/Ripley county line to the U.S. Highway 421 and State Road 62 intersection the "Major Samuel Woodfill Memorial Highway" .

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit a copy of this resolution to the family of Major Samuel Woodfill and the Commissioner of the Indiana Department of Transportation.

The resolution was read a first time and referred to the Committee on Roads and Transportation.

House Concurrent Resolution 19

Representatives Siegrist, Negele, Lehe, T. Brown and Klinker introduced House Concurrent Resolution 19:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION honoring Val Hilburn, the 2017 Court Appointed Special Advocate Volunteer of the Year.

Whereas, Val Hilburn was selected as the 2017 Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) Volunteer of the Year;

Whereas, Val Hilburn was presented this award on September 9, 2017, at the annual Indiana GAL/CASA Conference in French Lick;

Whereas, Val Hilburn has positively impacted the lives of the 46 children she has advocated for over the past 11 years;

Whereas, Val Hilburn is always willing to go beyond simply advocating to share years of knowledge and experience with other CASA volunteers for support and encouragement;

Whereas, In addition to her work as an advocate, Val Hilburn is always ready to help in fundraising events, one of which is the CASA Cycling Challenge, where she serves on the Cycling Event Committee and oversees parking for the two-day event;

Whereas, Best described as "committed", Val Hilburn has spent an extraordinary amount of time and energy making sure that children receive every opportunity to succeed and for the court case to end with a positive outcome for each and every child; and

Whereas, There is no greater accomplishment than to be a constant in a child's life; Val Hilburn has given children stability at a time when they greatly needed it: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly congratulates Val Hilburn on her selection as the 2017 Court Appointed Special Advocate Volunteer of the Year and thanks her for her years of dedicated service to the children of our state.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit a copy of this resolution to Val Hilburn.

Senate Concurrent Resolution 13

The Speaker handed down Senate Concurrent Resolution 13, sponsored by Representative Speedy:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION congratulating Bunker Hill Elementary School on its 100th anniversary.

Whereas, Bunker Hill Elementary School was named for its location on a hill, to show patriotism during World War I, and to continue the revolution of thought and ideas called the Enlightenment;

Whereas, Bunker Hill students formed a "bucket brigade" to help the school move into a new, larger building that was completed in 1962 and is still in use today after several renovations over the years;

Whereas, The first students to attend Bunker Hill did so before the use of motorized buses, riding in "horse hacks" driven by local farmers to and from the school building before the first bus came into use in 1920;

Whereas, Many beloved teachers have made Bunker Hill a special place for students over the years, including current second grade teacher and former Bunker Hill student Mrs. Cathy England, who organizes the annual Veterans Day program, fourth grade teacher Mrs. Cindy Andry, who is planning the fourth grade's twentieth annual trip to state historical locations in Southern Indiana, and first grade teacher Mr. Marc Hamilton, who is organizing the thirty-third running of the "1st Grade Mini 500";

Whereas, Bunker Hill's famous Annual Fish Fry event began in 1932 and ran for more than 50 years, culminating each year with the crowning of a Fish Fry King and Queen, and will be revived this year on April 27 to celebrate the school's 100th anniversary and will include recognition of several former Fish Fry Kings and Queens and the crowning of new Fish Fry royalty among current students;

Whereas, With the first parent-teacher organization being formed in 1921, Bunker Hill Elementary School has enjoyed a high level of parent and community involvement throughout the years and has received generous support for school activities and projects; and

Whereas, The students and staff of Bunker Hill have engaged in several key outreach programs over the years including collecting shoes to pay for water wells to be built in Third World Countries, sponsoring a school in Texas to aid in hurricane relief, and celebrating the school's centennial with 100 acts of kindness: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the House of Representatives concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly congratulates Bunker Hill Elementary School on its centennial celebration.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to transmit copies of this resolution to Dr. Kent Pettet, Principal

of Bunker Hill Elementary School, Dr. Bruce Hibbard, Superintendent of Franklin Township Community School Corporation, and Mr. Scott Sullivan, President of the Franklin Township Community School Corporation School Board.
