RESOLUTIONS ON FIRST READING

House Concurrent Resolution 59

House Concurrent Resolution 59, sponsored by Senator Merritt:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION honoring the life of Susan Kelley Jordan.

Whereas, Susan Kelley Jordan dedicated her life to educating and inspiring students, teachers and parents in the Metropolitan School District of Lawrence Township as a teacher and principal;

Whereas, In keeping with her life of putting her students first, Susan was tragically killed on January 26, 2016, when she bravely sacrificed herself for her students when they found themselves in harm's way;

Whereas, As the principal of Amy Beverland Elementary School, Susan led one of the best and most recognized schools in Central Indiana;

Whereas, Well known in education circles, many have described Susan as a legend in the education field and in her community;

Whereas, Susan Kelley Jordan lived her entire life as a hero — full of love and compassion for all;

Whereas, Susan Kelley Jordan was a dedicated mother, sister, and educator who devoted herself to her family, friends, and especially her students;

Whereas, Susan Kelley Jordan lived by the phrase "A hundred years from now it will not matter what my bank account was, the sort of house I lived in or the kind of car I drove, but the world may be different because I was important in the life of a child";

Whereas, Faith was paramount in Susan Kelley Jordan's life, and she was a longtime dedicated member of St. Luke's United Methodist Church; and

Whereas, Susan Kelley Jordan dedicated her life to children and spent the last moments of it protecting those children: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly recognizes Susan Kelley Jordan for her outstanding leadership in education, her dedication to her students and family, and her final act of heroism, placing herself in harm's way to protect the lives of her students.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives transmit a copy of this resolution to the Metropolitan School District of Lawrence Township and the

family of Susan Kelley Jordan.

Whereas, It is right and just to recognize those brave firefighters, who have played a significant role in making our community what it is today, and whose tireless contributions and sacrifices have improved the safety of our residents; and

Whereas, The distinguished service of these firefighters has brought pride and honor to the state of Indiana: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly wishes to acknowledge the service of these brave firefighters to the state of Indiana and to thank them for their bravery in defending our homes and communities from the threat of fire. House Concurrent Resolution 24

House Concurrent Resolution 24, sponsored by Senator Head:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION urging the Indiana Department of Transportation to rename the section of State Road 25 in Carroll County from State Road 39 to E. 900 N. as the Carroll County Veterans Memorial Highway.

Whereas, The torch of patriotism has been held high in Indiana by brave men and women willing to fight to ensure that freedom forever lives in our country and around the world;

Whereas, The General Assembly recognizes the great sacrifices made by Indiana veterans in the service of their state in time of war;

Whereas, These veterans served their state and country well, sometimes making the ultimate sacrifice in the service of their country;

Whereas, These Carroll County veterans served their country bravely and honorably in World War II, Korea, Vietnam, Grenada, and Desert Storm;

Whereas, Because America has relied upon her veterans in times of war to protect our way of life, it seems only just and proper that America honor the veterans of all her wars; and

Whereas, Many states, including Indiana, have designated and named portions of a state or federal highway as a memorial to those who served our nation in time of war: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly urges the Indiana Department of Transportation to provide the necessary signage to rename the section of State Road 25 in Carroll County from State Road 39 to E. 900 N. as the Carroll County Veterans Memorial Highway.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives transmit a copy of this resolution to the commissioner of the Indiana Department of Transportation.

The resolution was read in full and adopted by voice vote. The Chair instructed the Secretary to inform the House of the passage of the resolution.

House Concurrent Resolution 28

House Concurrent Resolution 28, sponsored by Senator Arnold:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION urging the Indiana Department of Transportation to rename that part of the road from the city limits on the northeast side of LaPorte along State Road 2 to the intersection with U.S. Highway 20 at Rolling Prairie as the "Governor Harold W. Handley Highway".

Whereas, Governor Handley was a native of LaPorte who served in the U.S. Army as a Lieutenant Colonel in World War II;

Whereas, Governor Handley began his political career as a State Senator and served as President of the Senate from 1940 to 1941;

Whereas, Governor Handley served as Lieutenant Governor from 1953 until 1957 and as the 40th Governor of Indiana from 1957 until 1961;

Whereas, During his tenure, economic infrastructure was expanded in Indiana through the creation of a veterinary school at Purdue University as well as securing grants for the land at the Lake Michigan port location;

Whereas, Governor Handley eliminated a majority of the property taxes during his tenure;

Whereas, Governor Handley personally advocated for mental health reform and expanded state programs in support of mentally ill and disabled Hoosiers and remained dedicated throughout his life to several charities that worked to help the mentally disabled;

Whereas, Even after retirement, Governor Handley continued to assist his predecessors as part of the Constitutional Revision Commission; and

Whereas, This outstanding Hoosier deserves special recognition: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly urges the Indiana Department of Transportation to rename that part of the road from the city limits on the northeast side of LaPorte along State Road 2 to the intersection with U.S. Highway 20 at Rolling Prairie as the "Governor Harold W. Handley Highway".

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives transmit a copy of this resolution to the commissioner of the Indiana Department of Transportation.

The resolution was read in full and adopted by voice vote. The Chair instructed the Secretary to inform the House of the passage of the resolution.

House Concurrent Resolution 33

House Concurrent Resolution 33, sponsored by Senator Leising:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION urging the Indiana Department of Transportation to name the bridge on Highway 52 over the Flatrock River in Rushville the "Joseph Cotton Bridge".

Whereas, Joseph Frederick Cotton was born in Rushville on January 21, 1922, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph A. Cotton;

Whereas, Joseph graduated from Manilla High School, where he was a member of the basketball team and the 4-H Club;

Whereas, Joseph helped his father on the family farm until he was 20 years old and was smitten with flying;

Whereas, Joseph, whose flight instructor was Bob Winter, first soloed in a Taylorcraft plane at New Castle;

Whereas, Infatuated with flight, Joseph enlisted in the Army Air Corps and received his flight training in Texas;

Whereas, Joseph was commissioned as a second lieutenant and received his wings on June 26, 1943;

Whereas, As the co-pilot of a B-17 bomber on a mission over Athens, Greece, in November 1943, he was hit by enemy fire and forced to crash land on the island of Corfu, which was under German control;

Whereas, Joseph and the crew survived with the help of the Greek nationals and eventually arrived on Italian shores, where they were welcomed by a British merchant ship and sent on the final leg of their journey back to American hands;

Whereas, Soon after that Joseph began his career as a test pilot, ending up as the chief test pilot for the Air Force;

Whereas, Joseph piloted many exotic planes as a test pilot, including the XB-70, known as the Valkyrie;

Whereas, After retiring from the Air Force, Colonel Joseph Cotton was an engineering flight test pilot for United Airlines in San Francisco for 13 years;

Whereas, As a United Airlines test pilot, Joseph flew 84 different types of aircraft for a total of over 15,800 flight hours;

Whereas, During his career Joseph received numerous awards and recognitions, including being named the 1966 Pilot of the Year by the International Order of Characters, a Legion of Merit, an Air Medal, the Air Force Commendation Medal, and the Aerospace Walk of Honor; and

Whereas, Joseph Cotton spent his life looking for the next plane to master: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly recognizes the many accomplishments and contributions to the aviation industry made by Joseph Cotton. The members of the Indiana General Assembly urge the commissioner of the Indiana Department of Transportation to name the bridge over the Flatrock River on U.S. Highway 52 in Rushville the "Joseph Cotton Bridge" in his honor.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives transmit a copy of this resolution to the commissioner of the Indiana Department of Transportation and Joseph Cotton.

The resolution was read in full and adopted by voice vote. The Chair instructed the Secretary to inform the House of the passage of the resolution.

House Concurrent Resolution 41

House Concurrent Resolution 41, sponsored by Senator Ford:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION honoring Indiana State University.

Whereas, Indiana State University is celebrating its Sesquicentennial Era from 2015 to 2020 marking the 150th

anniversary of its founding legislation in 1865 through the 150th anniversary of the opening of its doors in 1870;

Whereas, Throughout its history, Indiana State University has prepared top-notch teachers, principals, and superintendents who will educate our state's future leaders;

Whereas, Indiana State University has also prepared other skilled and knowledgeable graduates for Indiana's workforce, including business leaders, health professionals, pilots, law enforcement officers, social workers, and more;

Whereas, Indiana State University also provides access and opportunity to a quality higher education to a diverse student body that has evolved into the most diverse student population of any public residential campus in Indiana;

Whereas, Indiana State University transforms the lives of students whose parents did not have the benefit of a college education, thereby forever changing their lives by opening the doors to all that a college education provides;

Whereas, Indiana State students annually provide more than 1.4 million hours to nonprofit agencies and others throughout the state, nation, and world;

Whereas, Indiana State University has been given a number one national ranking by Washington Monthly for its service and an overall national ranking of 20th for the value it provides to society;

Whereas, Indiana State University currently has an all-time enrollment high of 13,584 students, surpassing the previous record of 13,533 set in 1970 and marking a 30 percent growth since 2008; and

Whereas, Indiana State University continues to have an ongoing commitment to educating Hoosiers, with 75 percent of its current students and 89 percent of its freshman class coming from Indiana and 85 percent of its more than 90,000 graduates staying in Indiana to live, work, and raise their families: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly acknowledges the good work done by Indiana State University for the student body and the economies of Indiana.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives transmit a copy of this resolution to Indiana State University.

The resolution was read in full and adopted by voice vote. The Chair instructed the Secretary to inform the House of the passage of the resolution.

House Concurrent Resolution 52

House Concurrent Resolution 52, sponsored by Senator Merritt:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION honoring volunteers for contributing more than 100,000 hours of labor to the Indiana State Archives.

Whereas, Forty-three volunteers at the Indiana State Archives devoted 6,816 hours in 2015 to processing, indexing, and preserving Indiana's historical records;

Whereas, This is the equivalent of four full-time employees;

Whereas, Since 1991, 185 volunteers have contributed 100,260 hours to projects ranging from data entry to the preservation of records of Hoosier veterans dating from the Battle of Tippecanoe to the Vietnam War;

Whereas, Volunteers have entered more than one and a half million names into a database that is now searchable online at the Indiana State Archives' web site;

Whereas, These efforts contributed to the Archives' web site being named "Best State Website" for genealogical research for a fifth time in 2015 by Family Tree Magazine;

Whereas, Volunteers in the Conservation Lab have given 2,500 hours to preserve original Indiana House and Senate bills dating back to 1863; and

Whereas, These many hard-working volunteers have made Indiana's historical records more accessible to the public and have assisted in preserving the records for future generations: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly recognizes and thanks the dedicated volunteers for their many hours of service to the Indiana State Archives.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives transmit a copy of this resolution to the Friends of the Indiana State Archives and Jim Corridan, director of the Indiana Archives and Records Administration.

The resolution was read in full and adopted by voice vote. The Chair instructed the Secretary to inform the House of the passage of the resolution.

House Concurrent Resolution 53

House Concurrent Resolution 53, sponsored by Senator Tallian:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION recognizing the roles played by May Wright Sewall, Zerelda Wallace, and Helen Gougar in the Indiana women's suffrage movement.

Whereas, The League of Women Voters, a nonpartisan political organization, encourages informed and active participation in government, works to increase understanding of major public policy issues, and influences public policy through education and advocacy;

Whereas, The League of Women Voters was founded by Carrie Chapman Catt in 1920 during the convention of the National American Woman Suffrage Association;

Whereas, As the 100th anniversary of the organization approaches in 2020, special recognition is due to three women who played key roles in the suffrage movement in Indiana — May Wright Sewall, Zerelda Wallace, and Helen Gougar;

Whereas, May Wright Sewall was born on May 27, 1844, in Greenfield, Wisconsin, and died on July 23, 1920, before getting the right to vote in Indiana;

Whereas, Although she was most well known for the role she played in the women's suffrage movement, May Wright Sewall was an important educator and a leader in the area of civic improvement and peacemaking;

Whereas, After graduating from Northwestern Female College in 1866 and earning an M.A. degree in 1871, May Wright Sewall taught school in Corinth, Mississippi, was the principal of the high school in Plainwell, Michigan, and was a teacher at a high school in Indianapolis;

Whereas, Along with her second husband, Theodore L. Sewall, May founded the Girls' Classical School of Indianapolis in 1882;

Whereas, During this time May had helped establish the Indianapolis Equal Suffrage Society, led a campaign that narrowly failed to secure women's suffrage in Indiana, and was chairman of the executive committee of the National Woman Suffrage Association;

Whereas, May Wright Sewall held many positions during her career including the first recording secretary and president of the National Council of Women, president of the International Council of Women, and first vice president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs;

Whereas, Zerelda Wallace was born on August 6, 1817, in Kentucky and came to Indianapolis with her family in the early 1830s;

Whereas, Zerelda was active in the temperance movement, was instrumental in the founding of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, and served as the organization's first Indiana state president and national vice president;

Whereas, Zerelda campaigned for women's suffrage with the same vigor as she had in the temperance movement, serving as president of the Equal Suffrage Society of Indianapolis, was a founder of the Indiana Woman's Suffrage Association, and was elected vice president of the National Woman Suffrage Association;

Whereas, A contemporary of Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Susan B. Anthony, Zerelda was known as a powerful speaker for both the temperance and women's suffrage movements and was in constant demand, addressing gatherings across the nation;

Whereas, Zerelda testified before the United States Senate Judiciary Committee on women's right to vote, addressed the 1883 International Council of Women held in Washington, D.C., on "The Moral Power of the Ballot", and was a featured speaker at the conventions of the National Woman Suffrage Association;

Whereas, Zerelda was elected posthumously to the Indiana Academy and was also selected to represent Indiana in the League of Women Voters National Hall of Fame;

Whereas, In recognition of her outstanding accomplishments, an Indiana State Historic Marker was dedicated to Zerelda Wallace at the Central Christian Church in Indianapolis;

Whereas, In addition to her work with the women's suffrage movement, Zerelda was the wife of Governor David Wallace, the sixth governor of Indiana, and the stepmother of Lew Wallace;

Whereas, Helen Gougar was born on July 18, 1843, near Litchfield, Michigan;

Whereas, Helen accepted a teaching position in Lafayette, where she met and married John Gougar, a young attorney;

Whereas, As a young wife, Helen was involved in several benevolent organizations in Lafayette, including the YMCA, Lafayette Home Association, Ladies' Benevolent Society, and the Second Presbyterian Church;

Whereas, In April 1878, Helen addressed a Blue Ribbon Temperance Rally in Lafayette and persuaded 500 attendees to sign a temperance pledge, a speech marking the beginning of Helen's commitment to the temperance movement and, through

this work, to becoming an ardent suffragist;

Whereas, Helen ventured into the newspaper business when she became the editor of "Our Temperance Herald", renaming it "Our Herald";

Whereas, Helen traveled to Kansas and spearheaded the drafting of a municipal suffrage bill, uniting the local Women's Christian Temperance Union with the Kansas Equal Suffrage Association, a bill that passed in 1887;

Whereas, In 1888 when the state and national Republican party refused to include suffrage and temperance in the party platform, Helen left the Republican Party and became a member of the Prohibition Party, becoming a delegate to the Prohibition Party National Convention in 1892;

Whereas, It was this party involvement that put Helen at odds with her suffragist comrades, including Susan B. Anthony;

Whereas, Helen Gougar died in 1907 without getting the right to vote;

Whereas, In recognition of her outstanding accomplishments, an Indiana State Historic Marker was dedicated to Helen Gougar in Lafayette; and

Whereas, These three great women continue to be an example and inspiration for all Hoosiers: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly recognizes the many accomplishments of these three outstanding women in the suffrage movement in Indiana and nationally.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives transmit a copy of this resolution to the League of Women Voters.

Whereas, The job of a lineman is often left unrecognized, and the hardworking men and women who work in inclement weather and other challenging conditions to ensure the safe and reliable delivery of electric energy to all citizens of our state are most deserving of gratitude, appreciation, and honor: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly recognizes Indiana's electric utility line men and women for their dedication and commitment to keeping the lights on and keeping Hoosiers safe all across Indiana.

SECTION 2. That the Indiana General Assembly urges the Governor to declare February 29, 2016, as "Electric Lineman Appreciation Day" in Indiana.

Senate Resolution 49, introduced by Senators Delph and M. Young:

A SENATE RESOLUTION expressing profound disappointment in Carrier Corporation and United Technologies.

Whereas, Willis Carrier designed the first modern air-conditioning system in 1902, founded Carrier Engineering Corporation in 1915, and was named one of TIME Magazine's 100 most influential people of the 20th century;

Whereas, Carrier Corporation has manufactured its products in Indianapolis for more than half of the company's life and has received taxpayer dollars to develop its workforce;

Whereas, Carrier Corporation and United Technologies announced its plan to move 2,100 Hoosier jobs from Indiana to Mexico, where Carrier may pay its workers as little as \$3.00 per hour;

Whereas, The primary function of a corporation is to maximize its stakeholder wealth where stakeholders historically included its stockholders, employees, community, state and country, but it has become about stockholder wealth only, which is exemplified by Carrier Corporation and United Technologies decision to move its corporation to Mexico;

Whereas, United Technologies, Carrier's parent company, owns Otis Elevators which moved a large portion of its Bloomington plant from Indiana to Mexico;

Whereas, In its most recent fiscal year, United Technologies had a net income of \$6,100,000,000 on net sales of \$57,000,000,000, or \$156,164,383.56 per day;

Whereas, United Technologies is led by Gregory J. Hayes, a graduate of Purdue University;

Whereas, Forbes and the Tax Foundation labeled Indiana a top ten state for business, and Indiana maintains a AAA credit rating;

Whereas, Indiana ranks first in the United States for Cost of Doing Business, second in the United States for Regulatory Environment, and eighth in the United States for overall Business Tax Climate;

Whereas, At a time when other states are raising taxes to keep up with mounting state debt, Indiana's long history of smart fiscal choices, balanced state budgets and cash reserves in a rainy day fund puts the Hoosier State in a position to actually lower taxes resulting in a corporate income tax rate that has

steadily decreased each year, from the current 6.5 percent to 4.9 percent by 2021;

Whereas, This tax decrease, coupled with Indiana’s flat state corporate tax rate on adjusted gross income and no gross receipts tax or inventory tax, makes the state even more attractive to businesses seeking a home;

Whereas, Although Indiana’s economy is growing at a pace that fosters record employment and investment, federal corporate tax rates are among the highest in the developed world and companies throughout the United States must contend with an overall regulatory burden on manufacturing imposed by the EPA that has nearly doubled since 1997;

Whereas, According to U.S. Energy Information Administration data in 2003, only four states in the nation had lower average industrial electricity prices than Indiana, but by 2015, 25 states had lower prices than Indiana;

Whereas, Average industrial electricity prices have surged 75 percent in Indiana in that time, while only increasing 37 percent in the nation as a whole, which is a result of the push by the federal government to discourage the use of fossil fuels and encourage the use of renewable energy – a factor that discourages corporations from staying in the state; and

Whereas, Irrespective of Gregory Hayes’s connection to Indiana, Carrier’s decades-long success in Indianapolis, the taxpayer money offered to support Carrier, and the stellar fiscal year had by United Technologies, 2,100 Hoosiers will lose their jobs: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana Senate expresses profound disappointment in United Technologies and the Carrier Corporation.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to transmit a copies of this Resolution to the board of directors at United Technologies and Carrier, Chris Nelson, and Bob McDonough.
