RESOLUTIONS ON FIRST READING

House Concurrent Resolution 21

Representatives McNamara, Judy, Ziemke, Bacon, Hamm, Price, Culver, Cox, Ellington, Austin, Miller, Karickhoff, Burton, Negele, Forestal, Davisson, T. Brown, Olthoff, Thompson, Cook, VanNatter, Riecken, Truitt, Shackleford, Errington, Steuerwald, Soliday, Lawson, V. Smith, Mayfield, Nisly, Friend, Frizzell, Harman, Baird, Niezgodski, Rhoads, Morrison, Speedy, Aylesworth, Beumer, Braun, Lehman, Zent, Frye, Kersey, C. Brown, Kirchhofer, Wolkins, Leonard and Dermody introduced House Concurrent Resolution 21:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION urging the Higher Learning Commission to revise its current guidelines on faculty qualifications so that Hoosier high school students can continue to benefit from Indiana's strong, high quality dual credit offerings.

Whereas, Indiana is committed to offering high quality dual credit courses to high school students throughout the state;

Whereas, Over 66,000 students enrolled in dual credit courses during the 2013-2014 school year, and the number of students is estimated to increase each year;

Whereas, The Higher Learning Commission is an independent corporation and one of six regional institutional accreditors authorized by the United States Department of Education to accredit Indiana postsecondary institutions;

Whereas, The Higher Learning Commission's own 2013 study of dual credit ranked Indiana second in the nation for state policies in place to assure quality;

Whereas, State level data demonstrate that Indiana dual credit students are more likely to go to college, have higher college GPAs, persist in college, and not need remediation than those who do not take dual credit courses;

Whereas, The Higher Learning Commission issued guidelines on October 1, 2015, that did not receive adequate public comment;

Whereas, These guidelines restrict the ability of Indiana colleges and universities to exercise judgment about the academic background a faculty member must have in order to teach;

Whereas, The aforementioned guidelines do not recognize the value of a documented record of excellence in teaching as a means for determining qualified faculty;

Whereas, The Higher Learning Commission has emphasized inputs rather than using data and student outcome metrics as criteria for qualifying faculty; and

Whereas, Indiana, being conscious of the need to provide quality education for its students, asserts that Indiana colleges and universities are in the best position to select faculty to teach courses, including dual credit courses: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Higher Learning Commission is urged to revise its current guidelines on faculty qualifications to allow Indiana colleges and universities appropriate flexibility and judgment in selecting faculty, including dual credit faculty, while at the same time assuring quality.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit copies of this resolution to all members of the Indiana congressional delegation, the United States Department of Education, and the Higher Learning Commission.

The resolution was read a first time and adopted by voice vote. The Clerk was directed to inform the Senate of the passage of the resolution. Senate sponsor: Senator Kruse.

House Concurrent Resolution 22

Representatives Mahan, Price, Heaton and Lawson introduced House Concurrent Resolution 22:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION recognizing the valuable contribution of the Indiana Sheriffs' Association.

Whereas, The Indiana Sheriffs' Association was established in 1930 to promote better communication and exchange between the sheriffs and other law enforcement personnel;

Whereas, For the past 80 years with the support of its membership and supporters, the Indiana Sheriffs' Association has proven itself to be an asset to both those in law enforcement and the citizens of Indiana;

Whereas, In 1977, the Association was incorporated as a not-for-profit organization and began to focus on providing education and training for sheriffs and department personnel throughout the state that was not otherwise available;

Whereas, Effective January 1, 2003, Zachary's Law requires sheriffs' departments to jointly establish and maintain the Indiana Sheriffs' Sex Offender Registry;

Whereas, The Indiana Sheriffs' Association web site serves as an important resource for detailed information about individuals who by law must register as sex or violent offenders when moving into an Indiana county: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly recognizes the valuable contribution of the Indiana Sheriffs' Association.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit a copy of this Resolution to Stephen Luce, Executive Director of the Indiana Sheriffs' Association.

The resolution was read a first time and adopted by voice vote. The Clerk was directed to inform the Senate of the passage of the resolution. Senate sponsors: Senators Holdman and Arnold.

House Resolution 16

Representative V. Smith introduced House Resolution 16:

A HOUSE RESOLUTION recognizing the Fifth Annual Bill Johnson Film Festival.

Whereas, African American Achievers Youth Corps, Inc. partners with other local groups to sponsor a film festival dedicated to Gary native William L. Johnson, which is hosted by the actor;

Whereas, William Johnson is a graduate of Emerson School for Visual and Performing Arts and has had starring roles in many theatrically released projects, including the lead role in "Blue Hill Avenue", which garnered top honors at the Acapulco and Black Hollywood Film Festivals;

Whereas, More than just an actor, William Johnson's goal is to "reinvest the majority of his earnings into a structured business that supports the advancement of the urban community. By spreading the message of self-reliance and providing opportunities to qualified individuals from disadvantaged backgrounds, he hopes to break the cycle that keeps generations impoverished";

Whereas, Equally important to William Johnson is his passion to deliver conscious messages through his music using his stage persona, "Brotha Bill";

Whereas, William Johnson has been involved in more than 20 film projects and independent short films and features, including "Motives 2", "The Mannsfield 12", "Crossover", "Doing Hard Time", "Tears of a Clown", "Motives", "Move", "Wanted: Soulful Energy Xchange" with Gary Dourdan and Mari Morrow, and director Tony Spires' "Two Degrees" starring Don "DC" Curry;

Whereas, Domingo Guyton, Terrence "Ty" Mann, Reggie Gaskin, and Christopher Nolen also attended the Fifth Annual Bill Johnson Film Festival;

Whereas, Domingo Guyton is President of HOPE Multimedia Company, whose mission is "to create, produce, and promote expressive art based on Christian principles that uplift, educate, and positively impact all of humanity";

Whereas, Born and raised in Mattapan, Massachusetts, Domingo used these experiences to apply the essence of that culture to his college classroom experience;

Whereas, Domingo's early life experiences are documented in two books - "Teens with the Courage to Give" by Jackie Waldman and "Passionaries" by Barbara Metzler;

Whereas, Domingo's music has appeared in TV shows and movies, he was the drummer for six years for Grammy Award winning Tavares, and he was the writer, producer, and director of YTF, which won five awards including the Audience Award at the 2013 San Francisco Black Film Festival, and the Best Inspirational Film at the 2013 Peachtree Village International Film Festival;

Whereas, Domingo was also the co-producer of the film "Lest We Forget: The Black Holocaust", which won Best Documentary for HBO films at the 2007 Martha's Vineyard African American Film Festival;

Whereas, Major (Retired) Terrence "Ty" Manns enlisted in the United States Army in 1980 after having been accepted into the ROTC program at Wright State University in Dayton, Ohio;

Whereas, Upon graduation in 1989, Ty was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant, Infantry, Regular Army and served as an Infantry Officer in tactical assignments in Germany, Korea, and worldwide from 1989 to 2003; however, Ty never lost his passion for storytelling and filmmaking;

Whereas, In 1999 Ty met Rick Bieber, former President of HBO Pictures, and, with his support and mentoring, Ty's filmmaking knowledge and experience expanded;

Whereas, In 2006 Ty and Rick joined together to create the independent film production company Angel City Pictures (ACP);

Whereas, In 2011, Ty formed CME Films where he wrote, produced, and directed films including "The Turning Point", a faith based film about a soldier suffering from PTSD, and "The ITCH", a comedy about a couple's relationship troubles at the seven year point of their marriage;

Whereas, Reggie Gaskins is an award winning writer and director who began his acting career at the prestigious Freedom Theatre, where he perfected his skills as an actor, playwright, and director;

Whereas, Reggie Gaskins began writing plays for himself because he was unhappy with the limitations of the roles in which he was cast;

Whereas, Moving to Los Angeles, Reggie found success as a comedic actor, television and film writer, director, and producer;

Whereas, Reggie has also found success as an independent film writer, producer, and director with two award winning films, "The Lying Truth" and "Restraining Order";

Whereas, Christopher Nolen founded Nferno Productions in 1998;

Whereas, Christopher has created a proven brand of urban entertainment, production, and distribution by creating positive and entertaining content for minorities and global audiences as a whole;

Whereas, Christopher's projects include the feature length films "Deep Passion", "Subtle Seduction", "The Good Life", "Four Seasons", and "72 Hours";

Whereas, Excited and passionate about writing, directing, and producing films, Christopher is looking to expand his talents into the world of television;

Whereas, Christopher began working in the industry as a model in Chicago, which naturally turned to acting and finally led him to writing, producing, and directing;

Whereas, The Bill Johnson Film Festival came about as an idea to help northwest Indiana come together to share ideas and discussion surrounding film messages; and

Whereas, The arts are a valuable tool in creating an atmosphere of understanding and opening a discussion to help bring the community together in a meaningful way: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana House of Representatives recognizes the value to the community of the Bill Johnson Film Festival and thanks William L. Johnson for dedicating his time and energy to this worthwhile project.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit copies of this resolution to the African American Achievers Youth Corps, Inc., and William L. Johnson.

A HOUSE RESOLUTION recognizing the Community Civility Counts Initiative of the Gary Chamber of Commerce and the Times Media Company.

Whereas, The Community Civility Counts (CCC) Initiative was spearheaded by the Public Policy Committee of the Gary Chamber of Commerce and The Times Media Company;

Whereas, The CCC came together through discussions centering on making a positive impact in Gary and surrounding communities;

Whereas, Increasing numbers of incidents of disrespect, discourtesy, intolerance, bullying, and violence in our communities reflect a need to raise the consciousness level of all Hoosiers from every walk of life;

Whereas, All citizens must be better so that we can all live in a civil manner and in a civilized society;

Whereas, It is the goal of the CCC to help transform our communities through positive programs and relationships;

Whereas, In order to better understand opposing points of view, we must first hear and understand these points of view;

Whereas, Governmental entities must also adhere to the principles of civility;

Whereas, The way government reaches a decision can be as important as the actual decision;

Whereas, Meetings conducted in a fair, open, and civil manner can enhance credibility and acceptance; and

Whereas, The Community Civility Counts Initiative is delivering an awareness campaign to remind everyone about the need for civility and treating each other right: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana House of Representatives commends the efforts of the Community Civility County Initiative and The Times Media Company to spread the word that "Together We Win".

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit copies of this resolution to Charles Hughes, Executive Director of the Gary Chamber of Commerce, Bob Heisse, Executive Editor of The Times Media Company, and Chris White, Publisher of The Times Media Company.

Whereas, The Penn High School's Varsity Baseball team (26-9) won the IHSAA Class 4A state championship game 3-2 against Terre Haute North on June 20, 2015 at Victory Field in Indianapolis;

Whereas, The win secured the program's fourth championship title in its history with previous wins occurring in 1994, 1998 and 2001;

Whereas, Following the game, senior catcher Tim Lira was named the IHSAA L. V. Phillips Attitude Award winner, which honors a senior nominated by their principal and coach who has excelled in mental attitude, scholarship, leadership and athletic ability;

Whereas, This championship win was the last for Penn High School's retiring athletic director Ben Karasiak; and

Whereas, In celebration of the victory, the high school

invited students and community members to honor the team as they brought back the trophy on June 22 at the school: Therefore,

the House of Representatives concurring:*

SECTION 1. That the Indiana Senate congratulates the Penn High School Varsity Baseball team on its IHSAA championship title.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to transmit copies of this resolution to Penn High School's Principal Steve Hope, Penn High School's Baseball Coach Greg Dikos, and the members of the 2014-2015 Varsity Baseball team.

Whereas, The win capped off a historic season for the team who recorded a total of six perfect scores of 90, and only missed three out of 810 words spelled during the entire season, setting a school record;

Whereas, The 10 perfect spellers at the state finals from the team were Kanika Arora, Faihaan Arif, Muqsit Buchh, Maggie Finnessy, Presto George, Hannah McGinness, Hannah Smith, Athreya Sundaram, Michelle Tapp and Chris Yun; and

Whereas, Kanika Arora was honored by the IASP at the state finals for correctly spelling every word in both regional and state finals for all four years of her high school career: Therefore,

SECTION 1. That the Indiana Senate congratulates the Penn High School Spell Bowl Team on its 15th state championship title and continued dedication to excellence.

(b) Salary and wages include the amounts of pay increases available to employees under the compensation plan adopted under IC 20-28-9-1.5, but do not include the teacher evaluation procedures and criteria, any components of the teacher evaluation plan, rubric, or tool, or any performance stipend or addition to base salary based on a performance stipend to an individual teacher under IC 20-43-10-3.

(c) **A school employer and an exclusive representative may bargain to give the school employer discretion to provide a supplemental payment to a teacher in excess of the salary specified in the school corporation's compensation plan for a teacher newly hired in a hard to fill position.**

SECTION 9. [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2016] (a) **The legislative council is urged to assign the topic of establishing a voluntary defined contribution retirement plan for teachers and the consequences of establishing the plan to an appropriate interim study committee with expertise in pensions and pension management oversight.**

(b) **This SECTION expires December 31, 2016.**"
