## RESOLUTIONS ON FIRST READING

### Senate Resolution 86

Senate Resolution 86, introduced by Senator Merritt:

A SENATE RESOLUTION recognizing the renaming of the Indiana Intelligence Fusion Center to the Senator Thomas J. Wyss Indiana Intelligence Fusion Center.

*Whereas, In the aftermath of the terrorist attacks of*

*September 11, 2001, numerous governmental authorities determined that the lack of communication among intelligence and law enforcement agencies was a factor in the tragedy;*

*Whereas, States were thus urged to create intelligence fusion centers to provide for the timely and effective sharing of intelligence information among the various state and federal law enforcement and intelligence agencies regarding terrorist activity;*

*Whereas, Already active at the federal level with this issue, providing leadership and oversight to the fusion center process as a member of both the United States Department of Homeland Security Advisory Council for Homeland Security and the National Homeland Security Consortium, Senator Wyss was one of the earliest proponents for an Indiana fusion center;*

*Whereas, Senator Wyss thereafter became a principal architect of the Indiana Intelligence Fusion Center, serving as an advisor to Governor Mitch Daniels for the issuance of Executive Order 06-04, which established the center, and then authoring the bill that placed the center into Indiana Code;*

*Whereas, Senator Wyss has since continued his commitment to the center and the security of Hoosiers by providing his time and expertise to help draft the center's charter, and by serving as a member of Indiana's Counter Terrorism and Security Council; and*

*Whereas, The founding, effectiveness, and continued success of the Indiana Intelligence Fusion Center is in great part due to Senator Wyss' leadership and efforts: Therefore,*

*Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 1. That the Indiana Senate recognizes the renaming of the Indiana Intelligence Fusion Center to the Senator Thomas J. Wyss Indiana Intelligence Fusion Center.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to transmit a copy of this Resolution to Senator Thomas J. Wyss, Governor Michael R. Pence, and the Executive Director of the Indiana Department of Homeland Security, John H. Hill.

The resolution was read in full and adopted by voice vote.

### Senate Resolution 73

Senate Resolution 73, introduced by Senator Patricia Miller:

A SENATE RESOLUTION honoring Senator Sue Landske upon her retirement from the Indiana State Senate.

*Whereas, Senator Sue Landske has led a distinguished career of public service, starting with her election as the Lake County Center Township Assessor from 1978 to 1984, and as a Colonel in the National Guard Reserve, before being elected to the Indiana State Senate in 1984;*

*Whereas, Senator Landske currently serves as the Assistant President Pro Tempore, chairs the Senate Committee on Elections, and also serves as the ranking member of the Civil Law Committee and as a majority member on the Tax and Fiscal Policy Committee;*

*Whereas, Throughout her 30 years in the Senate, Senator Landske has championed a number of issues that have bettered the lives of the people in her district in Northwest Indiana and the lives of Hoosiers all across the state;*

*Whereas, Several of Senator Landske's key proposals include the sweeping redistricting reforms following the 2010 census she authored that established objective guidelines for creating legislative and congressional districts, the legislation to encourage women to enter the engineering field, the bill to expand free in-state tuition to all Hoosier Purple Heart recipients, and Senator Landske helped author and shepherd legislation that provided for living wills;*

*Whereas, For her contributions and efforts, Senator Landske has been awarded the Sagamore of the Wabash twice, was named both the Outstanding Republican Senator and the Business and Professional Woman of the year in 1985, and in 2012, Senator Landske was named Republican Woman of the Year by the Indiana Federation of Republican Women;*

*Whereas, Senator Landske and her husband, William, own and operate All Golfcar, Inc., and have five children and seven grandchildren; and*

*Whereas, Senator Landske's dedication, hard work, and passion will be greatly missed in the Indiana State Senate and throughout the Statehouse: Therefore,*

*Be it resolved by the Senate of the  
General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 1. That the Indiana Senate honors Senator Landske upon her retirement and sincerely thanks her for her years of service to the Indiana State Senate.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to transmit copies of this Resolution to Senator Sue Landske and her family.

The resolution was read in full and adopted by voice vote.

### **Senate Resolution 78**

Senate Resolution 78, introduced by Senator Paul:

A SENATE RESOLUTION honoring Senator Johnny Nugent upon his retirement from the Indiana State Senate.

*Whereas, Senator Johnny Nugent has served his Indiana district in the Indiana Senate for over 35 years, during which he served as chair of the Senate Agriculture and Small Business Committee for more than 20 years. He also served as chair of the Roads and Transportation Committee, and was ranking member of the Insurance and Financial Institutions Committee. During his tenure in the Senate, Senator Nugent has represented Bartholomew, Dearborn, Decatur, Jackson, Jennings, Ohio, Ripley, Union, Franklin, Switzerland, and Fayette Counties;*

*Whereas, Senator Nugent, Majority Floor Leader Emeritus of the Senate Majority Caucus, was first elected to the Indiana State Senate in 1978. He cut his teeth in politics by serving on the Dearborn County Board of Commissioners from 1966 to 1974, where he was the youngest commissioner ever elected in the State of Indiana at the age of 26;*

*Whereas, Since his first days in the legislature, Senator Nugent has been dedicated to helping his constituents in southern Indiana, authoring legislation to exempt taxes on heating fuel for residents in Indiana. He also authored legislation requiring that disciplinary action taken against doctors be reported to the Medical Licensing Board, and sponsored legislation requiring school bus drivers to undergo criminal history checks;*

*Whereas, Senator Nugent has also worked on behalf of Hoosier servicemen and women, as Senator Nugent is a veteran himself, having served for seven years in the United States Army and Army Reserve. Senator Nugent has fought to ensure veterans receive the recognition they deserve for protecting our freedom, repeatedly co-authoring and supporting efforts to honor Purple Heart recipients in Indiana. He also co-authored legislation to create Purple Heart license plates, as well as a bill to expand education benefits for all Purple Heart recipients in Indiana, and in 2005, Senator Nugent co-authored legislation to support Indiana National Guard troops while on active duty deployments, and ensure their education benefits upon their return;*

*Whereas, It is well known that Senator Nugent has long been a champion for Second Amendment rights. While in the Senate, he has authored multiple pro-Second Amendment bills, including Indiana's "Castle Doctrine" legislation, as well as the nation's first lifetime concealed carry permit. He has also been a strong supporter of hunters' rights throughout his tenure;*

*Whereas, In addition to his public service in the Indiana Senate, Senator Nugent has been heavily involved in his community. He is a "Life Member" of the National Rifle Association (NRA) and serves on the NRA Board of Directors. He is also a "Life Member" of the Indiana State Rifle and Pistol Association. Senator Nugent is a member of the Murat Shrine Temple of Indianapolis, Southeastern Indiana Shrine Club, and the Dearborn County Chamber of Commerce. He is also a fifty-year member of Lawrenceburg Mason Lodge #4 and a former*

member of the Dearborn County Hospital Board of Trustees; and

*Whereas, Senator Nugent's experience and patriotism will be greatly missed by his constituents and colleagues in the State Capitol: Therefore,*

*Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 1. That the Indiana Senate honors Senator Johnny Nugent upon his retirement and sincerely thanks him for his years of service to the Indiana State Senate.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to transmit copies of this Resolution to Senator Johnny Nugent, his wife of over 50 years, Nancy, and his daughter, Suzi.

**Senate Resolution 85**

Senate Resolution 85, introduced by Senators Lanane, Breaux, Arnold, Broden, Mrvan, Randolph, Rogers, Skinner, Stoops, Tallian, Taylor, and R. Young:

A SENATE RESOLUTION honoring Senator Lindel Hume upon his retirement from the Indiana State Senate.

*Whereas, Lindel Hume served in the Indiana House of Representatives from 1974 through 1982 prior to winning a seat in the Indiana Senate in 1982;*

*Whereas, Senator Hume currently represents Senate District 48, encompassing all or portions of Dubois, Gibson, Knox, Pike, Spencer, and Warrick counties;*

*Whereas, Senator Hume has shown expertise with his knowledge of Rules of the Indiana Senate, and served in a variety of leadership positions throughout the years, including his current position as Senate Minority Whip;*

*Whereas, Senator Hume, known for his ability to reach across party lines to accomplish priorities, has earned a reputation as an outspoken advocate of property tax reform as well as a variety of issues relating to agriculture, small business, economic development, and criminal justice;*

*Whereas, Key pieces of legislation include the distressed roads fund, the 1977 Police and Firefighters Pension Fund, the criminal code revision, long-term disability program for state employees, and redistricting measures;*

*Whereas, Senator Hume was involved in setting up the Indiana Senate's first high-tech electronic legislative software;*

*Whereas, Senator Hume has been appointed to serve on the Law and Criminal Justice Committee of the National Conference of State Legislatures, a bipartisan organization that serves the*

*legislators and staffs of the nation's fifty states, its commonwealths, and territories;*

*Whereas, Senator Hume graduated from Oakland City University and earned his bachelor's degree with a major in mathematics and a minor in physics, and received an honorary Doctor of Laws degree from Oakland City University in 2004;*

*Whereas, Outside of the legislature, Senator Hume had a successful career working at Potter & Brumfield and a subsequent Siemens company, where he progressed through the ranks of supervisor in the quality assurance lab, quality control specialist, manager of strategic planning and internal auditing, Director of Corporate Affairs, and worked in a consulting capacity for Siemens from 1999 to 2007;*

*Whereas, Senator Hume is a member of Local #1459 of the International Association of Machinists;*

*Whereas, Senator Hume is a charter member of the Board of Directors of the Lyles Station Historic Preservation Corporation, served on the Board of Trustees for Oakland City University, a precinct committeeman from 1968-1976, a member and former president of the Oakland City Kiwanis, a member of the Institute of International Auditors, and a member of the Gibson County Conservation Club;*

*Whereas, Senator Hume, known for his dry wit and distinguished style, revealed his hidden talents to the world in 2013 when he won the 6th annual Hoosier Idol talent competition by singing and playing guitar on a self-composed song entitled "Fields of Wildflowers," which was written in honor of his mother;*

*Whereas, It has been discovered that Senator Hume is 10th cousins with Senator Tallian, both being direct decedents of George Hume from the Virginia Territory, proving that greatness runs in the family and that the apple doesn't fall far from the tree;*

*Whereas, Senator Hume resides in Princeton, Indiana, is a member of the Brenton Chapel Church of Christ, and with his wife Judy, who passed away in 2010 after 50 years of marriage, has two adult children and six grandchildren; and*

*Whereas, No matter where Senator Hume's life has taken him, he always finds himself Back Hume in Indiana: Therefore,*

*Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 1. The Indiana Senate wants to acknowledge and thank Senator Lindel Hume for his many achievements during his 40 years of service as an Indiana legislator, and wishes him well on all his future endeavors.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to transmit copies of the resolution to Senator Lindel Hume.

### Senate Resolution 70

Senate Resolution 70, introduced by Senator Merritt:

A SENATE RESOLUTION honoring Senator Thomas J. Wyss upon his retirement from the Indiana State Senate.

*Whereas, Senator Tom Wyss has served his district in the Indiana State Senate for almost 30 years, during which he chaired the Senate Committee on Homeland Security, Transportation, and Veterans Affairs and has been a member of the Senate Committees on Appropriations, Local Government, and Rules and Legislative Procedure;*

*Whereas, Prior to his election in 1985, Senator Wyss had already been serving his state and nation through the Indiana Air National Guard since 1966, and retired as a lieutenant colonel in 1997;*

*Whereas, His experience in the military contributed greatly to his time in the Senate, where he created the Indiana Commission on Military and Veterans Affairs, authored a law that makes it easier for service members to apply their military skills to an Emergency Medical Services license, and in 2007, he authored Indiana's most comprehensive military veterans' benefits legislation;*

*Whereas, Senator Wyss has also spearheaded key proposals to protect Hoosiers, such as authoring legislation to require everyone to wear a seat belt, to prohibit the dangerous practice of texting while driving, and after an 11-year battle, to lower the legal limit of the state's drunk driving law to 0.08;*

*Whereas, For his efforts in the Senate, Senator Wyss has been continually recognized, including with the 2013 Charles Dick award for his contributions to Hoosier veterans, the Indiana Disabled American Veterans named Senator Wyss the "Legislator of the Year" in June 2013, and the Indiana American Legion presented Senator Wyss with the Distinguished Public Service Award in July 2013;*

*Whereas, Senator Wyss has also been heavily involved in his community as a board member of the Hoosier Burn Camp and the Northeast Indiana Burn Foundation, as a board member of the Fort Wayne Medical Education Advisory, and he is a founding member of the Fort Wayne Crime Stoppers Advisory Board;*

*Whereas, Senator Wyss is retired from General Electric Systems and is a Purdue University graduate;*

*Whereas, Senator Wyss and his late-wife Shirley have two daughters and five grandchildren; and*

*Whereas, Senator Wyss's expertise, passion, and spirit will be*

*greatly missed in the Indiana Senate and throughout the Statehouse: Therefore,*

*Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 1. That the Indiana Senate honors Senator Wyss upon his retirement and sincerely thanks him for his years of service to the Indiana State Senate.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to transmit copies of this Resolution to Senator Thomas P. Wyss and his family.

The resolution was read in full and adopted by voice vote.

### Senate Resolution 79

Senate Resolution 79, introduced by Senator Kenley:

A SENATE RESOLUTION honoring Senator Allen E. Paul upon his retirement from the Indiana State Senate.

*Whereas, Senator Allen Paul has served his district in the Indiana State Senate for nearly 30 years. During his time in the Senate, Senator Paul has chaired the Senate Committee on Insurance, served as the ranking member on the Senate Committee on Financial Institutions, and sat on the Senate Committees on Commerce, Economic Development & Technology, and Homeland Security, Transportation & Veterans Affairs;*

*Whereas, As a legislator, Senator Paul has authored numerous bills to support and enrich the lives of veterans and their families. Three of Senator Paul's signature legislative accomplishments include his "combat to college" bill, which requires universities in Indiana with at least 200 veteran students to support and provide educational assistance to veterans wanting to obtain a college diploma, legislation to offer in-state tuition for veterans who enroll in a state institution no later than one year after being discharged from the military, and legislation to provide financial assistance to more Hoosier military families facing economic hardships and to allow Indiana National Guard members activated for state duty to receive emergency assistance;*

*Whereas, Senator Paul's affinity for helping veterans stems from his own service in the United States Army and National Guard Reserve. Senator Paul is a decorated combat veteran of the Vietnam War, and has received the Bronze Star with Valor Device, the Combat Infantry Badge, and four Air Medals;*

*Whereas, In addition to being recognized for his military exploits, Senator Paul has received numerous civilian awards and distinctions, including the National Guard President's Award for Service, the National Federation of Independent Business Award, a Sagamore of the Wabash award, Howe*

*Military Academy's "Outstanding Alumni" recognition, Tau Kappa Epsilon's "Triangle Alumni Award," and the Indiana Chamber of Commerce's "Small Business Legislative Award";*

*Whereas, Senator Paul has also been a dedicated servant within his community, serving on the Alumni Board of Directors and the Board of Trustees for Howe Military Academy. Additionally, Senator Paul led efforts to secure funding for the construction of Johnson Hall and renovation of McDaniel Hall at the Richmond, Indiana campus of Ivy Tech, earning him the coveted Ivy Tech "President's Award";*

*Whereas, Senator Paul remains active in his community, and is a member of American Veterans (AMVETS), the American Legion, the Marine Corps League, United Way, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and the Vietnam Veterans of America. He is also a former president of the Tau Kappa Epsilon National Fraternity; and*

*Whereas, Senator Paul has finished his final year in office with the same vigor as when he was first elected, and his passion and dedication will be sincerely missed in the Indiana Senate and throughout the State Capitol: Therefore,*

*Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 1. That the Indiana Senate honors Senator Allen E. Paul upon his retirement and sincerely thanks him for his years of service to the Indiana State Senate.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to transmit copies of this Resolution to Senator Allen E. Paul and his family.

### Senate Resolution 81

Senate Resolution 81, introduced by Senator Stoops:

A SENATE RESOLUTION urging the Legislative Council to assign to an appropriate study committee the topic of education and prevention of sexually transmitted diseases.

*Whereas, Family planning is essential to securing the well-being and autonomy of women, while supporting the health and development of communities;*

*Whereas, The study committee will research how to improve access to rural health, genital human papillomavirus (HPV) education and vaccination, and sexually transmitted disease (STD) prevention;*

*Whereas, HPV is the most common STD. There are more than 40 HPV types that can infect males and females. Most people who become infected with HPV do not realize they are*

*infected or that they are passing the virus because there are no symptoms;*

*Whereas, There is no treatment for the HPV virus itself, but vaccines can protect males and females against some of the most common types of HPV;*

*Whereas, STDs, particularly Chlamydia and gonorrhea infections, are significant public health problems. More than 22,000 cases of Chlamydia and 6,400 cases of gonorrhea were reported in Indiana in 2010, making them the two most commonly reported communicable infections;*

*Whereas, Partners infected with Chlamydia and gonorrhea are often asymptomatic, and therefore, are unlikely to seek medical treatment;*

*Whereas, Even when doctors and other health practioners counsel patients about the need for partner treatment, some partners have limited or no access to medical care or choose not to seek care; and*

*Whereas, Improving access to family planning would help prevent the transmission of STDs, prevent pregnancy-related health risks in women, reduce infant mortality, and empower people and enhance education: Therefore,*

*Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 1. That the Legislative Council is urged to assign to an appropriate study committee the topic of education and prevention of sexually transmitted diseases.

The resolution was read in full and referred to the Committee on Health and Provider Services.

##### Senate Resolution 75

Senate Resolution 75, introduced by Senator Merritt:

A SENATE RESOLUTION urging the Legislative Council to assign to an appropriate study committee the topic of the feasibility of a proposed new soccer stadium in Indianapolis and other opportunities around the state for the development of professional sports development areas.

*Whereas, The Indy Eleven professional soccer team was announced in January 2013, has already sold 7,000 season tickets, and will play its first game on April 12, 2014;*

*Whereas, A state of the art stadium has been proposed at a cost of \$87 million, with seating for 18,500;*

*Whereas, The stadium would be the home venue for the Indy Eleven professional soccer team, and the stadium would be a multipurpose facility also hosting United States and international soccer games and concerts; and*

*Whereas, Professional sports development areas were first authorized in Indiana in 1997: Therefore,*

*Be it resolved by the Senate of the  
General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 1. That the Legislative Council is urged to assign to the appropriate study committee the topic of the feasibility of a proposed new soccer stadium in Indianapolis and other opportunities around the state for the development of professional sports development areas.

The resolution was read in full and adopted by voice vote.

##### Senate Resolution 80

Senate Resolution 80, introduced by Senator Waltz:

A SENATE RESOLUTION honoring the 20th anniversary of the Wabash Commentary.

*Whereas, In 1993, a group of Wabash College students recognizing the need for intelligent discourse on a wide range of political, philosophical, and current events, established a publication called the Will Hays Commentary. The first edition was published in the spring semester by students Ian Karnell, Jeremy Karnell, David Landrith, Mathew Fagan, Bret McBride, and Brent Waltz;*

*Whereas, The Commentary was swiftly endorsed by William F. Buckley, and Wabash alumni began to financially support the printing and distribution of the publication. This financial support has enabled the magazine to remain independent of administration and faculty control and to not be " beholden to any social, partisan, or religious agenda," as per its mission statement;*

*Whereas, The following year, the magazine changed its name to the Wabash Commentary and has been published continuously for the past 20 years; and*

*Whereas, Today, the publication is led by editor Sebastain Garren, and is staffed by Jacob Nettnay, Samual Bennett, Micah Chowning, Jacob Scherb, Zachary Cassel, Tyler Snodell, Mathew Binder, Noah Eppler, Tucker Mark, Zachary King, Shane Xuan, and Mark Shaylor: Therefore,*

*Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 1. That the Indiana Senate honors the 20th anniversary of the Wabash Commentary, and wishes the magazine further continued success.

SECTION 2.
