Page 41, line 16, delete "52 U.S.C. 20508;" and insert "52

U.S.C. 20508);".

Page 73, delete lines 4 through 40, begin a new paragraph and insert:

"SECTION 171. IC 3-11-7-15, AS AMENDED BY P.L.76-2014, SECTION 32, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE SEPTEMBER 1, 2014 (RETROACTIVE)]: Sec. 15. (a) A vendor may apply for approval of a proposed improvement or change to a ballot card voting system that is currently certified by the commission. A proposed improvement or change may not be marketed, sold, leased, installed, or implemented in Indiana before the application for the improvement or change is approved by the commission.

(b) An application for approval of an improvement or change must be in the form prescribed by the commission.

(c) The vendor applying for approval of an improvement or a change must have the improvement or change to the voting system tested by an independent laboratory accredited under ~~42 U.S.C. 1537f~~; **52 U.S.C. 20971**. The vendor shall pay any testing expenses incurred under this subsection.

(d) The election division (or the person designated under IC 3-11-16) shall review the proposed improvement or change to the voting system and the results of the testing by the independent laboratory under subsection (c) and report the results of the review to the commission. The review must indicate: ~~whether the proposed improvement or change:~~

(1) **whether the proposed improvement or change** has been approved by an independent laboratory accredited under ~~42 U.S.C. 1537f~~; **52 U.S.C. 20971**;

(2) **whether the proposed improvement** is a de minimis change or a modification;

(3) if the proposed improvement or change is a modification, whether the modification may be installed and implemented without any significant likelihood that the voting system would be configured or perform its functions in violation of HAVA or this title; and

(4) **whether the proposed improvement or change** would comply with HAVA and the standards set forth in this chapter and IC 3-11-15.

(e) After the commission has approved the application for an improvement or change (including a de minimis change) to a ballot card voting system, the improvement or change may be marketed, sold, leased, installed, or implemented in Indiana.

(f) An approval of an application under this section expires on the date specified under section 19(a) of this chapter."

Page 74, delete lines 21 through 42, begin a new paragraph and insert:

"SECTION 173. IC 3-11-7.5-5, AS AMENDED BY P.L.76-2014, SECTION 33, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE SEPTEMBER 1, 2014

(RETROACTIVE)]; Sec. 5. (a) A vendor may apply for approval of a proposed improvement or change to an electronic voting system that is currently certified by the commission. A proposed improvement or change may not be marketed, sold, leased, installed, or implemented in Indiana before the application for the improvement or change is approved by the commission.

(b) An application for approval of an improvement or a change must be in the form prescribed by the commission.

(c) The vendor applying for approval of an improvement or a change must have the improvement or change to the voting system tested by an independent laboratory accredited under ~~42 U.S.C. 15371~~; **52 U.S.C. 20971**. The vendor shall pay any testing expenses incurred under this subsection.

(d) The election division (or the person designated under IC 3-11-16) shall review the improvement or change to the voting system and the results of the testing by the independent laboratory under subsection (c) and report the results of the review to the commission. The review must indicate: ~~whether the proposed improvement or change:~~

(1) **whether the proposed improvement or change** has been approved by an independent laboratory accredited under ~~42 U.S.C. 15371~~; **52 U.S.C. 20971**;

(2) **whether the proposed improvement** is a de minimis change or a modification;

(3) if the proposed improvement or change is a modification, whether the modification may be installed and implemented without any significant likelihood that the voting system would be configured or perform its functions in violation of HAVA or this title; and

(4) **whether the proposed improvement or change** would comply with HAVA and the standards set forth in this chapter and IC 3-11-15.

(e) After the commission has examined and approved the application for an improvement or change to an electronic voting system (including a de minimis change), the improvement or change may be marketed, sold, leased, installed, or implemented in Indiana.

(f) An approval of an application under this section expires on the date specified by section 28(a) of this chapter."

Whereas, JoAnn was passionate about and advocated for senior health care and welfare, and was particularly concerned about reforms to Indiana's Adult Protective Services Program;

Whereas, JoAnn passed away peacefully after an extended illness on January 11, 2015: Therefore,

Senate Resolution 30, introduced by Senator Messmer:

Whereas, David C. Mitchell was raised in Terre Haute, Indiana;

A SENATE RESOLUTION congratulating Alexandra Skinner for being recognized as one of the top youth volunteers in Indiana during the 20th annual Prudential Spirit of Community Awards.

Whereas, In 1943, upon graduation from high school, David enlisted in the Army Air Force and two years later was mustered out as an Aerial Navigator;

Whereas, On February 10, 2015, Alexandra Skinner, an esteemed resident of Vincennes and senior at Lincoln High School, was recognized as one of the top youth volunteers in the state during the Prudential Spirit of Community Awards, a nationwide program that honors young people for outstanding acts of volunteerism;

Whereas, After his military service, David enrolled at the Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology and obtained his Bachelors of Science in Electrical Engineering in 1948;

Whereas, At the 20th annual presentation of this prestigious award by Prudential Financial in partnership with the National Association of Secondary School Principals, Alexandra was named a distinguished finalist for establishing After School Art Program;

Whereas, David's professional career began with the Detroit Edison Company and from there he transitioned to the Westinghouse Atomic Power Division where the engine for the submarine Nautilus was designed;

Whereas, Alexandra's innovative program provides hands-on art projects for children, and an accompanying website allows individuals to download additional projects;

Whereas, Most of David's career was based in Central and South America managing private electric power companies;

Whereas, Since establishing After School Art Program, Alexandra has worked with her high school art teacher and members of the National Honor Society to expand its reach, and the program is now offered in four counties throughout Indiana and in five other states across the country; and

Whereas, David retired from the Bolivian Power Company, a Nova Scotia company, as Chairman of the Board in 1988, but he remained on the Board until the end of 1996 at which time the company was sold;

Whereas, The success of Indiana and the strength of its communities depend, in great measure, upon the dedication of young people like Alexandra Skinner who use their considerable talents and resources to serve others: Therefore,

Whereas, David received an Honorary Doctorate's Degree from the Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology in 1983 and has served on the Board of Trustees for the university since 1988;

Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

Whereas, David was the Honorary Consul for the Government of Bolivia in Montreal from 1975-1977 and in Cincinnati from 1983-2001;

SECTION 1. That the Indiana Senate congratulates Alexandra Skinner on the significant achievement of being named one of the top youth volunteers in Indiana during the 20th annual Prudential Spirit of Community Awards.

Whereas, Joining the Service Corps of Retired Executives in 1997 in Cincinnati, David is now a member in Terre Haute;

Whereas, David also currently serves as the President of the Terre Haute Symphony Orchestra;

Whereas, David has been a member of the Rotary International in Oruro, Bolivia; San Salvador, El Salvador; Montreal, Quebec; La Paz, Bolivia; and for a short time,

Whereas, Currently an active member of the Rotary Club in Terre Haute, David has served in various Rotary Clubs for over sixty years now; and

Whereas, It is fitting that the Indiana Senate gives special recognition to David C. Mitchell for his exemplary service to Terre Haute, the Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology, and our country: Therefore,

Whereas, St. Stephen Bulgarian Eastern Orthodox Church was founded in Indianapolis, Indiana in 1915, by Bulgarian and Macedonian immigrants;

Whereas, St. Stephen Bulgarian Eastern Orthodox Church is located within the Haughville neighborhood where Eastern European immigrants have historically resided;

Whereas, The church moved to its current location of 1435 N. Medford Avenue in 1955;

Whereas, St. Stephen Bulgarian Eastern Orthodox Church is the only Bulgarian Orthodox Archdiocese of the United States, Canada, and Australia;

Whereas, While the congregation has largely been comprised of individuals with Bulgarian and Macedonian heritage, it also includes individuals from a diverse range of ethnic backgrounds;

Whereas, The current parish priest is the Very Reverend Father Dimitur Angelov (1986 - Present) and his predecessor was the Very Reverend Boris Georgiev (1961-1986); and

Whereas, the 100th anniversary celebration will take place on September 11, 2015: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the House of Representatives concurring:

SECTION 1: That the Indiana General Assembly celebrates the 100th anniversary of the St. Stephen Bulgarian Eastern Orthodox Church.

Whereas, The student body of the Indiana Academy for Science, Mathematics, and Humanities is diverse, reflecting the geographic, ethnic, and cultural diversity of Indiana;

Whereas, The Indiana Academy for Science, Mathematics, and Humanities provides a physical, intellectual, and social environment in which students with exceptional academic ability can thrive in an appropriately exceptional learning community;

Whereas, The Indiana Academy for Science, Mathematics, and Humanities serves Indiana as a statewide center for gifted education so that students all across the state have access to programs and resources appropriate to their abilities;

Whereas, The Indiana Academy for Science, Mathematics, and Humanities' Outreach Program has established itself as the premier resource in the state for advanced teacher training in the area of teaching gifted and talented students; and

Whereas, It is fitting that we recognize the contributions of the Indiana Academy for Science, Mathematics, and Humanities by joining in the celebration of its 25th anniversary: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly congratulates the Indiana Academy for Science, Mathematics, and Humanities on 25 years of outstanding achievement in educating gifted and talented students in Indiana and joins in the celebration of its 25th anniversary.

SECTION 2. That the members of the Indiana General Assembly extend their best wishes to the Indiana Academy for Science, Mathematics, and Humanities for its continued success as an institution and for the continued success of its students.

Whereas, More than 8,000 INCPAS members work in the areas of public accounting, business and industry, education, government, and not-for-profit;

Whereas, Indiana CPAs are trusted business advisers who have contributed to the success of Indiana businesses for 100 years;

Whereas, Indiana CPAs possess a variety of expertise and provide a variety of services that offer accurate financial information and projections that keep Indiana businesses and the state's economy on track for future growth; and

Whereas, The CPA profession in Indiana and the Indiana CPA Society will celebrate its centennial anniversary in 2015: Therefore,
