RESOLUTIONS ON FIRST READING

Senate Resolution 58

Senate Resolution 58, introduced by Senator L. Brown:

A SENATE RESOLUTION urging the legislative council to assign to the appropriate study committee the task of studying issues related to contractual provisions creating physician non-competes and their impact on patient access to care in Indiana.

Whereas, A taskforce has been developed to explore health care workforce issues and concerns;

Whereas, Applicable reports have cited that there is an expected shortage of physicians in areas of primary care along with other health care workforce access problems;

Whereas, Non-compete clauses are often placed on physicians by hospitals, limiting the opportunity for physicians to stay and work in communities with areas of need, directly impacting patient's freedom of choice in health care providers and access to the best quality health care;

Whereas, Non-competition agreements can limit physicians from practicing Medicine in a defined geographic region for a specified amount of time or with a particular business interest;

Whereas, States including Delaware, Illinois, Maine, New Hampshire, New Mexico, Rhode Island, among others, have outlawed such non-compete agreements in physician contracts and Indiana has prohibited similar types of agreements in other professions; and

Whereas, Indiana is facing a physician shortage and patients are facing difficulties accessing care: Therefore,

*Be it resolved by the Senate of the
General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 1. That the legislative council is urged to assign to the appropriate study committee issues related to the public policy value of non-competition agreements and lack of defense provisions in physicians' contracts in Indiana.

The resolution was read in full and referred to the Committee on Health and Provider Services.

Senate Resolution 59

Senate Resolution 59, introduced by Senator L. Brown:

A SENATE RESOLUTION urging the legislative council to assign to the appropriate study committee the task of studying issues related to maintenance of certification requirements for physician licensure, hospital privileges, and insurance credentialing, and their impact on patient access to care in Indiana.

Whereas, A taskforce has been developed to explore health care workforce issues and concerns and applicable reports have cited an expected shortage of physicians in areas of primary care and other health care workforce access concerns;

Whereas, Indiana is facing a physician shortage and patients are facing difficulties accessing care;

Whereas, Licensing of physicians is a power retained by the individual states and efforts by various non-governmental organizations such as the American Board of Medical Specialties and Federation of State Medical Boards to wrest this power from the states, by forcing physicians to require maintenance of certification from national organizations in order to participate in licensure and various other aspects of patient care, is contrary to the well-being of Hoosiers;

Whereas, The cost of maintenance of certification is significant in terms of expense and time and runs counter to the goals of patient-centered medicine which results in decreased access and increased costs; and

Whereas, A number of other states including Florida, Oklahoma, Maryland, Missouri, Tennessee, Kentucky, New York, North Carolina, and Arizona have either enacted into law or have pending legislation that are collectively known as "Right to Care Acts": Therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the legislative council is urged to assign to the appropriate study committee issues related to the requirements for maintenance of certification for physician licensure, hospital privileges, and insurance credentialing in Indiana.

The resolution was read in full and referred to the Committee on Health and Provider Services.

Senate Resolution 60

Senate Resolution 60, introduced by Senator G. Taylor:

A SENATE RESOLUTION urging the legislative council to assign to the appropriate interim study committee the topic of bias motivated crimes.

Whereas, Indiana remains one of only five states in the country without an enumerated criminal statute addressing the punishment and sentencing of bias motivated crimes;

Whereas, The number of bias motivated crimes and hate groups, as reported by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and national civil rights organizations including the Southern Poverty Law Center and Anti-Defamation League, have increased in Indiana;

Whereas, Repeated legislative proposals to address bias motivated crimes in Indiana's criminal sentencing statutes have been unsuccessful; and

Whereas, The state of Indiana finds it important to contemplate proposals on how to properly address issues of discrimination and bias in society: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana Senate urges the legislative council to assign the topic of bias motivated crimes to the appropriate interim study committee.

SECTION 2. The interim study committee shall study the following issues related to bias motivated crimes: 1. A comparative study of state and federal statutes that address bias motivated crimes; 2. Current and future law enforcement training and education related to recognizing and responding to bias motivated crimes; 3. The identification of protected classes in civil and criminal anti-discrimination statutes; 4. The effectiveness of aggravating sentencing circumstances versus sentencing enhancements in addressing bias motivated crimes; 5. How Indiana courts are currently addressing bias motivated crimes.

The resolution was read in full and referred to the Committee on Rules and Legislative Procedure.

RESOLUTIONS ON FIRST READING

Senate Resolution 52

Senate Resolution 52, introduced by Senator Houchin:

A SENATE RESOLUTION congratulating the Dawalt Funeral Home on its 110th year of dedication and service to the Washington County community.

Whereas, In 1908, Winfield Dawalt and William Etzler took over a funeral home business from Curtis Calloway, located on the southwest side of Salem square, to begin the Dawalt and Etzler Funeral Home;

Whereas, The Dawalt and Etzler Funeral Home was officially renamed the Dawalt Funeral Home in 1940;

Whereas, In 1950, the Dawalt Funeral Home was purchased by Frank E. Newkirk Sr., an employee, and moved to its current location at 204 East Market Street

Whereas, Mr. Newkirk operated the funeral home until 1962, when he sold the business to his brother-in-law, Dan Kelly Sr., who operated the business until his passing in 2010;

Whereas, Dan Kelly Jr. joined the Dawalt Funeral Home as an employee in 1972 and continues to run the business with his son, Adam Kelly, who joined in 2006, following Dan Kelly Sr.'s passing;

Whereas, All three generations of the Kelly family were and are fully dedicated to the Dawalt Funeral Home, with Dan Kelly Sr. having raised Dan Kelly Jr. in the living quarters above the funeral home, and Adam Kelly now residing with his own family in the same quarters;

Whereas, The Dawalt Funeral Home has adjusted to support the lives and lifestyles of local residents over the past century, including major renovations to add a second chapel and an adjacent parking lot with a handicapped accessible entryway, adding parlors and lounges, and altering the length of funerals from multiple-day affairs with two or three days of visitation to two-day funerals;

Whereas, Although the Dawalt Funeral Home changed hands and faces over the past century, the goal to keep up with the ever-changing needs of the community and strive to offer the best possible facilities and services to the people of Washington County has never faltered; and

Whereas, The Dawalt Funeral Home will be proudly celebrating the 110th year of its family-owned and operated funeral service to Salem and Washington County in 2018: Therefore,

*Be it resolved by the Senate of the
General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 1. That the Indiana Senate congratulates the Dawalt Funeral Home on its 110th year of dedication and service to the Washington County community.

Senate Resolution 53

Senate Resolution 53, introduced by Senator Houchin:

A SENATE RESOLUTION congratulating WSLM Radio on its 65th anniversary of radio broadcasting.

Whereas, Don H. Martin grew up in Salem, Indiana, where he built a radio with a razor blade and copper wire before attending Indiana University as a broadcasting, drama, and education student for a few years before being drafted to serve in World War II;

Whereas, While serving as a Marine in Guam, Martin helped construct an Armed Services Radio station and began fostering the idea to create a radio station in his hometown;

Whereas, Upon returning from Guam, Martin completed his degree, taught English at Salem High School, and sponsored and coached the school debate team while applying for a license with the FCC for a radio station, WSLM 1220 AM;

Whereas, Martin received backlash from local WHAS 840 AM, requiring Martin and engineer Clarence Henson to plead before the FCC in Washington D.C. before finally receiving approval;

Whereas, WSLM was set to begin airing on Christmas Day 1952, but had its equipment stolen on Christmas Eve by a pirate station that the FCC discovered operating near Cincinnati, Ohio;

Whereas, WSLM re-obtained and reconditioned the stolen goods to officially begin broadcasting on February 14, 1953, being labeled by the Associated Press as the "Sweetheart Station of the Nation";

Whereas, WSLM Radio continued to operate under the ownership of Martin from its inception until 2011, when he passed the business along to his daughter and business partner, Rebecca White;

Whereas, White opened 3,000 watt WSLM 97.9 FM in 1992 and WHAN 17 TV, now WRLW TV, in 1994;

Whereas, At 5,000 watts, WSLM 1220 AM is the largest AM station in Southern Indiana and one of the only AM stations in the U.S. to be broadcasting in AM Stereo;

Whereas, WSLM, along with its sister radio station, currently reaches 3.6 million people across Indiana, Illinois, Ohio, and Kentucky;

Whereas, Martin was named a Broadcast Pioneer by the Indiana Broadcasters Association, of which his daughter now sits on the Board of Directors; and

Whereas, WSLM is celebrating 65 years of news, music, and loyal service to residents in Salem, Washington County, and beyond in 2018: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana Senate congratulates WSLM Radio on 65 years of radio broadcasting.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed

to transmit a copy of this Resolution to WSLM Radio.

Senate Resolution 54

Senate Resolution 54, introduced by Senator Houchin:

A SENATE RESOLUTION congratulating Knapp Miller Brown Insurance on serving the residents of Washington County for 100 years.

Whereas, Knapp Miller Brown Insurance began serving the insurance needs of those in Salem and the surrounding Washington County in 1918;

Whereas, Knapp Miller Brown Insurance merged with three different agencies including Etlzer Insurance, Hedrick Tash Insurance, and the Brown Agency in the early 1990s, all with long histories within the community;

Whereas, Knapp Miller Brown Insurance acts as an independent agency and shops among different providers for a company that best meets each individual client's insurance needs, including automobile, home, health, life, farm, business, commercial, and event insurance;

Whereas, Knapp Miller Brown Insurance searches among over twelve insurance companies to best support each client, including Eastern Alliance, ECM Insurance Group, Indiana Farmers Mutual Insurance Group, IPEP Health and Workers Compensation Plans, Keystone National Insurance Company, Liberty Mutual Insurance, Markel Insurance, Progressive Insurance, Safeco Insurance, Secura Insurance Companies, Selective Insurance, and Westfield Insurance;

Whereas, In 2007, Knapp Miller Brown Insurance became one of around 31 Keystone Agencies within the state of Indiana, which has provided a number of opportunities for the agents including allowing for more insurance options and divisions, training opportunities, and conferences to stay on top of the market;

Whereas, The stellar customer service and community support provided by Knapp Miller Brown Insurance over the past century has set the organization apart as one of the most involved and important companies in Washington County; and

Whereas, Knapp Miller Brown Insurance will be celebrating its 100th year of serving the community's insurance needs and supporting the community in 2018: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana Senate congratulates Knapp Miller Brown Insurance on serving the residents of Washington County and beyond for 100 years.

Senate Resolution 55

Senate Resolution 55, introduced by Senator Ford:

A SENATE RESOLUTION honoring Congresswoman Virginia Jenckes on the 80th anniversary of the end of her tenure as the first female United States Representative for the State of Indiana.

Whereas, Virginia Ellis Somes was born in Terre Haute, Indiana, on November 6, 1877 to James Ellis and Mary Oliver Somes;

Whereas, Jenckes graduated from Wiley High School and attended Coates College for one year before marrying Ray Greene Jenckes in 1912, with whom she had one daughter in 1913;

Whereas, After her husband's passing in 1927, Jenckes single-handedly managed their 1,300-acre farm along the banks of the Wabash river and raised her daughter;

Whereas, Jenckes helped secure a plank in the Democratic National platform for flood control plans in 1928 after witnessing massive flooding that required her to organize the placement of 3,000 sandbags to contain a dike breach in 1927;

Whereas, In 1932, Jenckes was persuaded to run for the United States House of Representatives at the age of 55 with a campaign strategy to end alcohol prohibition in order to raise corn prices from ten cents a bushel back up to pre-prohibition prices at nearly a \$1.30 a bushel;

Whereas, Jenckes campaigned as an independent Democrat against two incumbents but visited small towns in all ten of her district's counties, putting 15,000 miles on her vehicle, to persuade voters;

Whereas, Jenckes was elected from 1932 to 1938 as one of eight women in the United States House of Representatives, most of whom were appointed after the deaths of their husbands to finish their terms;

Whereas, During her tenure in the House of Representatives, Jenckes voted to repeal prohibition, urged rehabilitation programs for veterans, secured \$18 million in funding for flood control projects along the Wabash River Basin, advocated for

workers through the Railroad Retirement Act, and voted for the Social Security Act;

Whereas, Upon completing three terms in the House of Representatives, Jenckes settled in Washington, D.C., volunteering for the American Red Cross and helped five priests escape from Hungary through the Hungarian Freedom Fighters during the 1956 uprising;

Whereas, Jenckes returned to Terre Haute, Indiana, to settle for the remainder of her long life, where she passed away at the age of 98 on January 9, 1975;

Whereas, Jenckes served with distinction by zealously advocating for Hoosiers as the first female Hoosier elected to the United States House of Representatives from 1932 to 1938; and

Whereas, It is fitting that we celebrate the 80th anniversary of the service of the first female Hoosier elected to the United States House of Representatives: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana Senate honors the late United States Representative Virginia Jenckes on the 80th anniversary of her tenure as the first female United States Representative for the State of Indiana.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to transmit a copy of this Resolution to Sheron J. Dailey.

Senate Concurrent Resolution 48

Senate Concurrent Resolution 48, introduced by Senators Leising, Perfect and Raatz:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION honoring the St. Louis Catholic Church of Batesville, Indiana, on the occasion of its 150th anniversary.

Whereas, In 1867, residents of the City of Batesville pledged money to the construction of a Catholic church within city limits and began constructing the St. Ludwig's Catholic Church in 1868;

Whereas, Reverend John Paul Gillig was appointed as the Church's first pastor and in 1869, the Franciscan Priests of Oldenburg, Indiana, were asked to assume the Pastorate and then appointed the first Franciscan Pastor, Fr. Louis Haverbeck, O.S.F.;

Whereas, The first service and dedication of St. Louis Catholic Church took place on September 18, 1870, with the Very Reverend Otto Jair, O.S.F., presiding;

Whereas, St. Louis Catholic Church conducted masses in Latin, homilies, announcements, and prayers in German, and added an English homily in 1887;

Whereas, A school was erected at St. Louis Catholic Church in 1871, which today serves 420 students in preschool through eighth grade and continues to be a vibrant and integral part of parish life;

Whereas, Over its 150 years of service, St. Louis Catholic Church has been a leader in the spiritual, moral, and educational life of the Batesville community; and

Whereas, St. Louis Catholic Church is celebrating its sesquicentennial year in 2018, and events will be held throughout the year in celebration, culminating on October 28, 2018, with an anniversary mass and reception. Therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the House of Representatives concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly honors and congratulates the St. Louis Catholic Church of Batesville, Indiana, on the occasion of its 150th anniversary.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to transmit copies of this Resolution to Father Stanley Pondo and members of the St. Louis Catholic Church Parish Council.
