RESOLUTIONS ON FIRST READING

House Resolution 14

Representative Pelath introduced House Resolution 14:

A HOUSE RESOLUTION memorializing Donnie M. Thomas.

Whereas, Donnie M. Thomas was born March 12, 1953, in Michigan City to the late Tommy Thomas and Sarah Nell Horton-Griffin and died on Thursday, May 11, 2017, at the age of 64;

Whereas, Thomas was a legendary athlete at Elston Senior High School, where he won statewide honors in football, basketball, and baseball;

Whereas, After graduating from Elston in 1972, Thomas starred as a linebacker on the Indiana University football team;

Whereas, He was selected to play professional football by the New England Patriots in the 11th round of the 1976 National Football League draft;

Whereas, At the end of his professional football career, Thomas returned home to his beloved Michigan City, where he taught school and coached for 34 years;

Whereas, Affectionately known to all as "Big D", Mr. Thomas forever influenced and inspired generations of young people in Michigan City through his love, compassion, generosity, and deep sense of caring;

Whereas, Thomas especially was loved and respected by his hundreds of players in various sports, who invariably remember a smile and a heart big enough to match his large exterior;

Whereas, On June 28, 1986, Thomas married the love of his life, Peggy Wright Thomas, in Michigan City;

Whereas, Thomas was deeply proud of his two children, Quinten J. Thomas and Kristen L. Thomas;

Whereas, Mr. Thomas was a member of New Hope Missionary Baptist Church and enjoyed fishing, cooking, sports, coaching, and, most of all, helping young people; and

Whereas, Donnie M. Thomas was a special presence in the lives of countless people, who will always miss this gentlest of giants: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit a copy of this resolution to the family of Donnie M. Thomas.

House Resolution 15

Representative Pelath introduced House Resolution 15:

A HOUSE RESOLUTION memorializing Carl Swenson.

Whereas, Carl Swenson was born to the late Arthur Carl and Agnes (Johnson) Swenson on November 7, 1938, in Brooklyn, New York;

Whereas, Swenson died on January 16, 2018, with his family at his side in Michigan City, Indiana;

Whereas, As a star amateur baseball player and graduate of Brooklyn Boys High School, Swenson was drafted by the San Francisco Giants in 1958 and played with the Artesia Giants;

Whereas, The Giants organization later sent Swenson to Michigan City to play with the Michigan City White Caps;

Whereas, On November 19, 1960, Swenson married his wife and love of his life, Lottie (Novak) Swenson;

Whereas, As one who instilled a love of baseball in generations of young people, Swenson owned and played with the Michigan City Saints, a team he established, was president of the local Catholic Youth Organization, and a longtime coach of the Michigan City Red Devils varsity baseball team;

Whereas, Swenson coached New Buffalo High School to a state baseball championship in 2005 and never removed his championship ring;

Whereas, Swenson's leadership skills extended beyond baseball, as he served as a Michigan City Common Councilman and a board member of Michigan City Area Schools;

Whereas, Swenson was in the wine and spirits industry for 53 years, retiring in 2015;

Whereas, Swenson was an inspiration and guide to countless young people in Michigan City, who will always remember and miss his love of baseball, his infectious personality, his colorful communication style, and his fundamental kindness and charity toward others;

Whereas, Carl Swenson was deeply committed to bettering the lives of his family and friends, the youth of his community, and the citizens of Michigan City: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit a copy of this resolution to the family of Carl Arthur Joseph Swenson.

House Resolution 16

Representative Summers introduced House Resolution 16:

A HOUSE RESOLUTION recognizing the Indianapolis Section of the National Council of Negro Women, Inc.

Whereas, The National Council of Negro Women, Inc. (NCNW) was founded in 1935 by Mary McLeod Bethune as a community service and civil rights advocacy organization for women of the African Diaspora;

Whereas, The National Council of Negro Women, Inc. is a nonprofit membership organization comprised of 36 national African-American women's organizations with more than 230 community and campus-based sections;

Whereas, The mission of the NCNW is to lead, empower, and advocate for nearly 3 million women, their families, and communities;

Whereas, The NCNW has been in existence in Indiana since 1947;

Whereas, The Indianapolis Section of the NCNW has an active membership of 136 members under the leadership of President Regina Majors, First Vice President Drenda Henry, Second Vice President Brenda Sims, Recording Secretary Stacia Gray, Assistant Recording Secretary Yalonda Brown, Treasurer Madora Lewis, Financial Secretary Judith Trabue, Historian Mollette Hall, Parliamentarian Natalie Summers-Henson, and Chaplain Bonita Hale; and

Whereas, The Indianapolis Section of the National Council of Negro Women, Inc. has contributed greatly to the local community and the nation: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana House of Representatives recognizes the great work done by the National Council of Negro Women, Inc. and the Indianapolis Section.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit a copy of this resolution to the leadership of the National Council of Negro Women, Inc., Indianapolis Section.

The resolution was read a first time and adopted by voice vote.

House Resolution 17

Representative Judy introduced House Resolution 17:

A HOUSE RESOLUTION urging the legislative council to assign to the appropriate study committee the topic of allocating up to \$4,000,000 from the Indiana state lottery revenues to benefit veterans.

Whereas, Too many of our country's and state's veterans live with complicating factors such as homelessness, medical problems, and mental health issues; and

Whereas, These needs are of utmost importance to the people of Indiana: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the legislative council is urged to assign to the appropriate study committee the topic of allocating up to \$4,000,000 from the Indiana state lottery revenues to benefit veterans.

SECTION 2. That if the topic is assigned to the appropriate study committee, the following should be included in the study:

(1) Providing grants for reimbursement for training county and city service officers.

(2) Providing grants to purchase computer equipment and software for county and city service officers.

SECTION 3. If an appropriate study committee is assigned the topic, the study committee shall issue to the legislative council a final report containing the study committee's findings and recommendations, including any recommended legislation

concerning the topic, in an electronic format under IC 5-14-6, not later than November 1, 2018.

The resolution was read a first time and referred to the Committee on Public Policy.

House Resolution 18

Representative Judy introduced House Resolution 18:

A HOUSE RESOLUTION urging the legislative council to assign to the appropriate committee the topic of designating November 9 of each year as "Gold Star Family Day".

Whereas, Gold Star families are the relatives of United States military personnel who died in battle;

Whereas, Beginning in World War I, the families of United States soldiers and sailors often flew flags with a blue star representing each member of the family serving in the military;

Whereas, If the family member died in battle, the blue star was changed to a gold star;

Whereas, In August 1947, the United States Congress authorized the military to present a gold star lapel pin to the family members of those killed in action;

Whereas, The first pins were simply a gold star on a purple background with a laurel wreath surrounding the star;

Whereas, The pin was modified by Congress in 1973 to a gold star with a gold background and four oak sprigs around the star;

Whereas, It is fitting that our nation and our state recognize the sacrifice that all Gold Star family members make when a father, mother, brother, sister, son, daughter, or other loved one dies in service to the nation; and

Whereas, The issue of designating November 9 of each year as "Gold Star Family Day" deserves further study: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the legislative council is urged to assign to the appropriate committee the topic of designating November 9 of each year as "Gold Star Family Day".

The resolution was read a first time and referred to the Committee on Public Policy.

Senate Concurrent Resolution 3

The Speaker handed down Senate Concurrent Resolution 3, sponsored by Representatives VanNatter and Lehe:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION urging the Indiana Department of Transportation to rename the bridge at State Road 28 (Walnut Avenue) in Frankfort the "Staff Sergeant Jamie Jarboe Bridge".

Whereas, Staff Sergeant Jamie Jarboe died March 21, 2012, in Topeka, Kansas, from wounds suffered on April 10, 2011, in Kandahar province, Afghanistan, when enemy forces attacked his unit with small-arms fire;

Whereas, Staff Sergeant Jamie Jarboe had been deployed to Afghanistan only months before he was shot in the neck, an injury that left him a quadriplegic;

Whereas, Twenty-seven-year-old Staff Sergeant Jamie Jarboe underwent more than 100 surgeries in the 12 months before he succumbed to his injuries;

Whereas, A 2003 graduate of Frankfort High School, Staff Sergeant Jarboe was a member of the 4th Squadron, 4th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Heavy Brigade Combat Team of the 1st Infantry Division from Fort Riley known as the Pale Riders;

Whereas, Staff Sergeant Jarboe joined the Indiana National Guard in 2005 and attended basic and advanced individual training at Fort Sill, Oklahoma;

Whereas, His military assignments included B Battery, 1st Battalion, 320 Field Artillery at Fort Campbell, Kentucky, and Troop A, 4th Squadron, 4th Cavalry, 1st Heavy Brigade Combat Team;

Whereas, Staff Sergeant Jarboe's dedication and devotion to service was recognized with the Bronze Star Medal, the Purple Heart, the Army Commendation Medal (awarded three times), the Army Achievement Medal, the Good Conduct Medal (awarded twice), the National Defense Service Medal, the Afghanistan Campaign Medal (ICS), the Iraq Campaign Medal (3CS), the Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, the Armed Forces Reserve Medal (M Device), the NCO Professional Development Ribbon, the Army Service Ribbon, the Overseas Service Ribbon, the NATO Medal, the Combat Action Badge, the Air Assault Badge, and the Expert Marksmanship Badge (Rifle);

Whereas, A soldier's soldier, Staff Sergeant Jamie Jarboe dedicated his life to his country and his family; and

Whereas, Throughout history, brave individuals like Staff Sergeant Jamie Jarboe have made the ultimate sacrifice in defense of freedom throughout the world; without individuals like Staff Sergeant Jarboe, freedom could not survive: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the House of Representatives concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly urges the Indiana Department of Transportation to rename the bridge at State Road 28 (Walnut Avenue) in Frankfort the "Staff Sergeant Jamie Jarboe Bridge".

SECTION 2. That copies of this resolution be transmitted by the Secretary of the Senate to the family of Staff Sergeant Jamie Jarboe and the Commissioner of the Indiana Department of Transportation.

The resolution was read a first time and referred to the Committee on Roads and Transportation.

Whereas, African American Achievers Youth Corps, Inc., partners with other local groups to sponsor a film festival dedicated to Gary native William L. Johnson, which is hosted by the actor;

Whereas, William Johnson is a graduate of Emerson School for Visual and Performing Arts in Gary and has had starring roles in many theatrically released projects, including a lead role in "Blue Hill Avenue", which garnered top honors at the Acapulco and Black Hollywood film festivals;

Whereas, More than just an actor, William Johnson's goal is to "reinvest the majority of his earnings into a structured business that supports the advancement of the urban community. By spreading the message of self-reliance and providing opportunities to qualified individuals from disadvantaged backgrounds, he hopes to break the cycle that keeps generations impoverished";

Whereas, Equally important to William Johnson is his passion to deliver conscious messages through his music using his stage persona, "Brotha Bill";

Whereas, William Johnson has been involved in more than 20 film projects and independent short films and features, including "Motives 2", "The Mannsfield 12", "Crossover", "Doing Hard Time", "Tears of a Clown", "Motives", "Move", "Wanted: Soulful Energy Xchange", "Two Degrees", and "Nothing Like Thanksgiving";

Whereas, The seventh annual Bill Johnson Black Film Festival will feature the films "Wasted Talent" by Larry Boyce and Andrew Arehart; "Pushing Skills" by Micheal Krehan; "All to Myself" by Maceo Lester; "Domestic Disturbance" by Antonio Jefferson; "Sawubuna" by Lungelo Kuzwayo; "Breathless" by Anaiis Cisco; "How My Mother Braids My Hair" by Savanna Kanu, Cameryn Gonzalez, Alexandria Fernando; "Silent Cries: The Prelude" by Shauntay Cherry; "Patrick Snow and the Eight Speed Dates" by Lauren Jackson; "Bill 2/29" by Maurice Simmons; "The Talk" by Emily Blake; "The Proposal" by Art Jones; "A Beautiful Love" by Stacey Larkins; "Amara" by Unreal Elias; "Rolling in the Deep" by Marcellus Cox; and "To the Brown Girl in the Room" by Zoë Davidson;

Whereas, Among the film producers, directors, and actors scheduled to attend the seventh annual Bill Johnson Black Film Festival are George McGill, Antonio Jefferson, "Domestic Disturbance"; Maceo Lester, "All to Myself"; Ken Lewis, "Final Interrogation"; Tara Ratney, "The Proposal"; Charles Greer IV, "Pushing Skills"; Saquan Jones, "Then There Were 4"; and Bill Johnson, "Nothing Like Thanksgiving";

Whereas, This year's festival will add a youth festival featuring short films produced by high school or college students;

Whereas, The Bill Johnson Black Film Festival came about as an idea to help northwest Indiana come together to share ideas and hold discussions surrounding film messages; and

Whereas, The arts are a valuable tool in creating an atmosphere of understanding and open discussions to help bring communities together in a meaningful way: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana House of Representatives recognizes the value to the community of the seventh annual Bill Johnson Black Film Festival and thanks William L. Johnson for dedicating his time and energy to this worthwhile project.
